Books-for-Europe Campaign Backed by 7 Auburn Parishes

Auburn — In response to an appeal from the Catholic Library Association, Washington, D.C., for books to aid the war stricken countries of the world in their educational program, seven parishes in Auburn are joining in the campaign.

A committee from St. Alphonsus Library staff is arranging for collection and shipping of the books.

"Read Wisely — Share Truth" is the Catholic Book Week Slogan being used to express the motivation behind the drive which will continue to February, the committee states.

"In the formative period of the Church in the United States, we were heavily indebted to three famous European missionary organizations for spiritual and material assistance; now, we must reciprocate in every possible manner," according to an Association statement. Continuing the statement:

"TO INSURE the highest possible caliber of books for our purpose, we have established these following criteria to be followed in choosing title for transmission to the Unit Chairman, Miss Anita Flores, Siena College, Library, Loudonville, N. Y.:

"A — The type of books and periodicals to be collected are not limited by age level, subject or language.

"B — The books and periodicals should be in good physical condition.

"C — Periodicals of the last 20 years may be included with preference given those indexed in the Catholic Periodical Index or other indexes, or titles of comparable quality, e.g., many foreign periodicals as La Vie Intellectuelle are not included in the C.P.I.

"D — The dates of publications to be included would be: books in the physical and biological sciences published within the past 25 years; books in the social sciences published within the past twenty years; an indefinite period for literature, for bilingual dictionaries and for most reference books except that encyclopedias over 25 years old probably would be of much value.

"E — Text books should be included, as there is an urgent need for this type of book.

"F — Books in any language are wanted.

"G — Any good book is acceptable.

"We trust this appeal to your charity will be met with a noble response. All of us received from foreign institutions and individuals touching letters which we often have not been able to fill satisfactorily."

The books may be left at any time during the month of February at the following churches: Holy Family, St. Mary's, St. Alphonsus, St. Francis, St. Hyacinth, St. Aloysius and St. Peter and Paul. Or they may also be deposited in a box at Bennett & Tracy's, Schreck's Furniture Store or The Catholic Shop.

Collection and shipping of the books is sponsored by a committee from the St. Alphonsus Library staff comprising Miss Mary Forshae, chairman, Mrs. Harvey Clark, Miss Agnes Nolan, Mrs. Louise Merna, Miss Catherine Anton, Miss Helen Brogan and Miss Catherine Ryan.
