Hospital Opens Children's Ward After Remodeling

Completely remodeled the Pediatrics Department of St. Joseph's Hospital, conducted by Sisters of St. Joseph in Elmira, presents a bright, cheerful appearance, and at the same time makes it possible to give the safest nursing care to the children.

This was realized on a visit by a Catholic Courier Journal representative visiting the hospital, this week.

The new ward was formerly two semi-private accommodations, which have been converted into a fine cubicle unit, providing individual accommodations for each child.

THE CUBICLES ARE constructed of metal below and glass partitions above of sufficient height to prevent any transfer of infection from one child to another.

The walls are light green and acoustical ceiling lessens noise appreciably. Recessed radiators provide more floor space, and a new knee controlled wash bowl makes it convenient for the nurse to wash her hands before and after caring for one of the little patients.

A fluorescent light provides central illumination while each cubicle has its own light on the wall. Two observation windows into the corridor make it possible for the nurse to observe the children at all times.
