DCCW Information Center Opens For Public Use

A Catholic Information Center, sponsored by the Rochester Diocese, Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, opened for public use on Ash Wednesday in the lobby-library of the Columbus Civic Centre.

Planned as a convenient place where Catholics and non-Catholics may make inquiries about the Catholic Faith and use the facilities of library, pamphlet racks and magazine files, the new Center will be open each weekday from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m.

On hand to greet the receptionists from the DCCW membership who will staff the Center was the Rev. Edward J. Tolster, assistant pastor of St. Augustine's Church, who will act as director of the new Information Committee.

FATHER TOLSTER outlined the duties of the staff to assist interested, non-Catholics who drop in seeking answers to questions about the Church and to arrange membership in a Convert Class which will begin in the Center Library on Monday, Mar. 14, at 8 p.m. He urged the committee to spread the word of the facilities of the new Center to their non-Catholic friends and to invite them to Monday night instruction classes.

Besides having receptionists to answer questions and supply books and free pamphlet material, the Center will continue to function as the Catholic Evidence Library with complete selection of the finest books on Catholic doctrine, history, biography and literature.

CATHOLIC BOOKS AVAILABLE



With 2,500 books offered, half of which are fiction, the Immaculate Conception Parish Library in Rochester is in increasing demand. Above is a part of the fiction section in which are found novels, romances and mysteries carefully selected for general reading.

2500-Book Library Marks 6th Anniversary in Parish

The Immaculate Conception Parish Library, first established fifty years ago, this month, celebrates the sixth birthday of its "second life," according to a report of library activities made to the parish this week.

Closed during the 1930's and reopened in 1943 under the direction of Howard Siebert assisted by St. Andrew's Seminary of the parish, the school basement library is today larger and busier than ever in its history.

The entire library collection of books consists of 2,500 volumes, 400 of which have been added to the shelves in the last six years. One half of the total number comprises the fiction section, which includes Catholic novels, romances, and mysteries.

In the non-fiction sections can be found a large selection of biography, spiritual reading, literature, history, and reference works.

An average of sixty books are in circulation every week. Regular library patrons number about two hundred twenty-five and many come from other parishes than the Immaculate. The privilege of library use is available to any one and books are distributed on a lending rather than a rental basis.

A special service of the library staff is the publication of a monthly bulletin, NEWS AND REVIEWS, which is mailed to all card holders. The bulletin, which has been published for the last ten months, offers reading suggestions, reviews of the most recent additions to the collection.

Another function of the Parish Library is the maintenance of pamphlet racks in the vestibules of the church.

Within the last year three motion pictures have been sponsored by the library to bring religious films before the public and to finance the purchase of new books. Three more movies have been scheduled for this Lent, the first of which, "The Life of the Little Flower," will be shown on Tuesday evening, March the eighth, at 8:30 p.m. immediately after Lenten devotions in the church.

"The Life of Saint Francis" will be presented on March 22 and "The Life of Mary Magdalene" on April 4.

The Library is open every Sunday morning from 10 o'clock until 12:30 p.m. and on Tuesday evenings from 7:30 to 9 o'clock.

co-chairmen of the affair. Uniformed veterans will serve at Mass and as color guard.

The presentation of the medal will be made at the breakfast by Commander Esse. Mr. Duffy has served Rochester for twenty-six years as a member of the Board of Education and was president of the Board for four years. He has been a trustee of the Chamber of Commerce for twenty years; director of the Community Chest drive for five years; trustee for the American Red Cross; member of the Executive Committee of Boy Scouts.

The exemplary Catholic life of this man was recognized years ago when His Holiness Pope Pius XI bestowed upon him the title of Knight of St. Gregory.

Mr. Duffy has been a member of St. Patrick's Church for many decades and has served as trustee and legal advisor for more than thirty years.

During the war years, Mr. Duffy was the Washington representative of the USO and led a traveler's life of two days in New York, two days in Washington and three days in Rochester.

Mr. Duffy was also a Supreme Court Justice and a member of Congress. He is a member of Rochester Knights of Columbus, and also of the Fourth Degree.
