

Holy Name Bowling Tournament Slated; K. C. National Tourney Opening Set

More than 2,000 Catholic bowlers in the Rochester area are expected to file entries for the 24th annual Holy Name Tournament to be staged beginning Apr. 23 on the Atlantic Recreation Hall alleys on Atlantic Ave., Rochester.

Entries must be filed no later than Mar. 27, according to Edwin Shaw, president of the Catholic Men's Bowling Association. They must be made with the Association secretary, William Drea, 1529 Clinton Ave. So.

ENTRANCE FEE for the tourney, a five-man event only, is \$15.00 per team. It is a handicap with 850 total as seventh and 70 per cent handicap for team under that figure. Prize list totals \$2,960, with first prize at \$200.
