

DCCW Information Center Opens For Public Use

A Catholic Information Center, sponsored by the Rochester Diocese, Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, opened for public use on Ash Wednesday in the lobby-library of the Columbus Civic Center.

Planned as a convenient place where Catholics and non-Catholics may make inquiries about the Catholic Faith and use the facilities of library, pamphlet racks, and magazine files, the new center will be open each weekday from 11 a. m. to 8 p. m.

On hand to greet the newcomers from the DCCW membership will staff the center which was opened by Rev. Edward J. Tostler, assistant pastor of St. Augustine's Church, who will act as director of the new Information Center.

FATHER TOSTLER outlined the duties of the staff to assist interested non-Catholics who drop in seeking answers to questions about the Church and to arrange membership in a Convert Class which will begin in the Center Library on Monday, Mar. 14, at 8 p. m. He urged the converts to attend the weekly sessions of the new center to their non-Catholic friends and to invite them to Monday night instruction classes.

Besides having receptionists to answer questions and supply books and free pamphlet material, the center will continue to function as the Catholic Bible Society library with complete selection of the finest books on Catholic doctrine, history, biography and literature.

Members of the DCCW Information Center will also be available at receptionists and Mrs. J. J. MacLellan, Mrs. Leo W. Fritz.

John "700" Terry, the terrific, started slowly but gained speed in his second and third games to lead Notre Dame to a three to one victory over Carlistus, with his 560 total. This victory kept Notre Dame in a tie for first place with Santa Clara. The race is so close that Terry is going to wear a picture of his dog "Mitz" on his tie next week to inspire him to a 600 total. Jack Friedel, who is always in their punching line, carried through with 528 and Frank O'Connor, the "shining light" of the "Fighting Irish" had 500.

Ernie Smolton had the best total for Carlistus with his 515. Bill Tarby, who has been flirting with 600 had an off-day and only got going in his last game which was 205. When asked what happened to him, Bill gave an explanation that his father, Steve, who is his inspiration was away at the National A. B. C. tournament at Atlantic City and so lacking in inspiration his games suffered.

SANTA CLARA stayed in the running by hanging out a three to one victory over St. John Fisher to remain in a tie for first place with Notre Dame.
