Parent's Role Studied In Lenten Series

Auburn — The Sacred Heart League of Holy Family Parish held its first Lenten discussion class Wednesday evening at the home of their newly elected president, Miss Kathleen Carmody. There was a large turnout of members.

The Lenten subject for the Rochester diocese is "Parental Responsibility." The booklet and discussions will touch on such important matters as the parent as educator, preparation of parents for religious instruction in the home, religious education of children by parents in the home, the pre-school child, the elementary school child, the high school student and the college student.

THE DISCUSSION Wednesday centered around the subject "The Parent as Educator." It was brought out that those who would rear civilization away from Christian discipline, seek to corrupt the family which is the cradle of civil life.

"Parents," it was pointed out, "have not only the right of training and directing their children, but the superadded obligation of shaping and directing the education of their little ones for God's purposes."

"Christian schools do not supplant, but only supplement, the work of parents as religious educators. The parent remains the chief religious educator and the home remains the chief school of religion."

"The minds of children are most influenced by the training they receive at home. If in their early years they find within the walls of their homes the rule of an upright life and the discipline of Christian virtues, the future welfare of the state will in great measure be guaranteed."

The next discussion group will meet at the home of Mrs. George Cuddy Wednesday evening, March 16, after church services. Mr. Eugene Kelly of the Sacred Heart League and long associated with discussion work launched her group last Monday and it is known as the St. Ann Group.

Newman Club Told Story Of Laity's Retreats

Geneva — Fifty-one members of the Newman club of the Colleges of the Seneca heard the story of the closed retreat movement for Catholic laymen, during a Communion breakfast Sunday, Mar. 6 at Hotel Seneca.

Speaker was Rev. Augustine Aylward, C.S.S.R., rector of Our Lady of the Lake Retreat House on Lochland Rd. where he has been stationed since 1945.

FATHER AYLWARD traced the history of the movement, briefly discussing what happens during the 24 hours of a week-end retreat. Retreatants keep silence during the entire retreat period except when conversing.

Retreat includes group conferences with retreat directors followed by periods of meditation, prayer, and private talks.

Father Aylward spoke of the spiritual value of the silent withdrawal from disturbances of everyday life, comparing it to General MacArthur's habit of intensive solitary preparation before discussing any campaign with his staff.

The speaker was introduced by Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, advisor of the Newman club. Guests were welcomed by John Powers, president of the club.

D. A. Home, South Street.

SPECIAL "KNIT-CROCHET" Clubs are being formed by members and their friends, who will meet at the C. D. A. Home, or at members' homes during Lent for knitting or crocheting mittens for children in war torn areas. Also, a number of "stitch-in" members and their friends are forming clubs in their homes.

Members, who cannot crochet or knit, are furnishing the yarn, and arranging to collect the yarn from donors.

The committee in charge of the project is composed of the following members: Miss Dora Mansfield, Mrs. Helen Lawson, Miss Isabel T. Goss and Mrs. John Foster.

A number of finished items were displayed at the meeting. Much enthusiasm is being shown in the project and it is hoped that the anticipated number of 800 items will be ready for shipment to New York shortly after Easter where it will be ready for shipment to the Pope's Storehouse for children, regardless of creed or race.

The articles are to be Court Auburn's gift to Pope Pius XII. Court Auburn sponsored a similar project last summer.
