4 Student Nurses From Here Given Caps At Elmira

Four Rochester girls, graduates of the 1948 class of Nazareth Academy received their caps in a class of 41 students at ceremonies in the Little Flower Chapel, Dunn Memorial, St. Joseph Hospital, Feb. 27.

The class received their caps from Sister Margaret Adelaide, hospital administrator.

Rochester girls are: Miss Ellen St. John, Miss Mildred Musson, Miss Virginia Sherry and Miss Helen Hodges.

The spirit of nursing, symbolized by the candle lighted from the Florence Nightingale lamp was exemplified by Miss Winifred Little, vice president of the Junior Class.

IN ADDRESSING the class, the Rev. Albert L. Simonetti, pastor of St. Anthony's Church, Elmira, warned against the danger of nurses becoming calloused and indifferent to sickness, because of the close and constant association with suffering.

He noted that the modern trend of thought is reverting to the pagan philosophy when the worth of a human being was based on brains, brawn and beauty.

Should an individual fail to meet the standards set up, in these three categories, he said, they were disposed of.

There is no difference between this line of early pagan thought, Father Simonetti said, and the present day proposal of euthanasia.

The nurses recited an Act of Consecration to Our Blessed Lady and the Florence Nightingale pledge.

The ceremony was concluded with Solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. The Rev. William J. Neighton, pastor of St. Peter and Paul's Church was celebrant, assisted by Father Simonetti as deacon and the Rev. Philip E. McGinn, hospital chaplain, as subdeacon.

Parish School Story Told Dansville PTA

Dansville — An explanation of the parochial school system was given by the Rev. John C. O'Donnell, pastor of St. Patrick's Church to members of the Parent Teachers Association at the regular monthly meeting held in Dansville Central High School, last week.

Parochial schools are obliged to meet all the State requirements, Father O'Donnell said. Their teachers must have the required training, they have a Superintendent of Schools in each diocese, also a Mother Superior in each Order of Sisters, and the Pastor of each parish is responsible for his school.

The subjects taught in parish schools are exactly the same as those in public schools, with the exception of one-half hour at the beginning of the school session each day, which is given to religious education.

Cardinal's Plight Deplored, Lawmakers Write H. N. Men

Canandaigua — Sympathetic replies from two Congressmen to resolutions sent them protesting the treatment of Hungary's Cardinal Josef Mindszenty were read Sunday at the monthly corporate Communion and breakfast of St. Mary's Church Holy Name Society.

Senator Irving M. Ives assured the Society of his "personal distress over the terrible fate" of the Cardinal, and stated he is supporting the resolution of Senator Bridges which condemns the action of the Hungarian government.

Rep. John Taber of Auburn declared it to be "a deplorable situation which should alert the free peoples of the world to the realization that with Communism we lose all freedom."

Approximately 125 members of the Society received Holy Communion at the 8 a. m. Mass and attended the breakfast and meeting in the parish hall. Hamilton Kennedy, president, presided. A proposed constitution and by laws were adopted.
