CDA Speaker Asks Women To Make Retreats

Auburn—Advantages of "The Retreat Movement" were explained to members of Court Auburn Catholic Daughters of Auburn, Catholic Daughters of America by Mrs. Charles E. Gehern, a member of Auburn Deanery, National Council of Catholic Women Speakers' Bureau at the annual St. Patrick's dinner.



Mrs. Gehern, a graduate of Nazareth College, Rochester, spoke at the dinner in the CDA Home, South St. March 11.

The retreats, Mrs. Gehern stated, are for the purpose of getting away from the busy world for awhile and doing a little spiritual thinking on why God made us to know Him to love Him and to serve Him in this world and to be happy with Him forever in the next world.

MRS. GEHERN TOLD of the graciousness and hospitality of retreats by nuns in charge of the various retreat houses throughout the country. She described experiences at the Genesee Retreat House in Rochester. There she said retreatants meet on Friday in time for the 6 o'clock dinner. After dinner she told of the "get acquainted period" followed by meeting the retreat master in the chapel.

Continuing she said "After a conference of discussion, Benediction is offered Saturday and Sunday mornings the retreatants hear Mass and receive Holy Communion. After breakfast, lunch and dinner conferences and discussions are held. Recreation periods are turned over to spiritual reading. Stations of the Cross, made privately or walks through the garden and to the grotto."

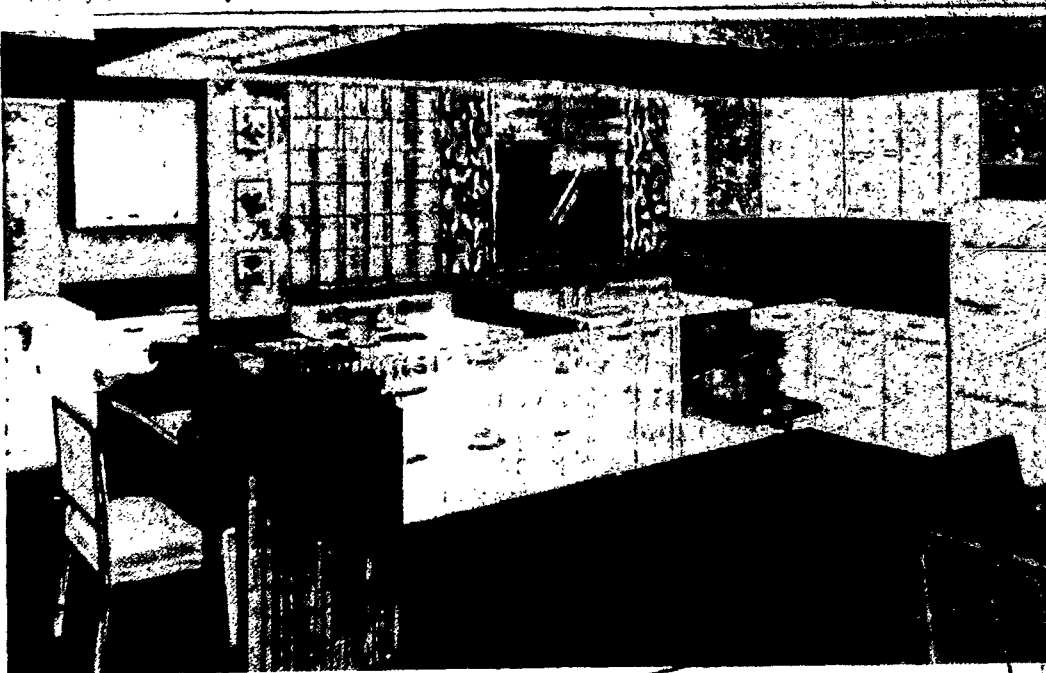
