

Stadium Building To Begin Monday

The athletic fortunes of Aquinas Institute will take a long awaited forward step next Monday afternoon when diocesan, city and school officials gather for ceremonies officially opening the construction of the 20,000 seat Aquinas Memorial Stadium on Ridgeway Ave. at Mt. Read Blvd.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney, Mayor Samuel B. Dickler, the Rev. Hugh Haffey, C.S.B., director of the Stadium Fund and the Rev. William J. Duggan, C.S.B., principal of Aquinas, will head a delegation of laymen on the Stadium Committee, the Aquinas Men's Club and Aquinas trustees at the formal beginning of the building work.

THE PUBLIC is invited to the 2 p. m. ceremonies.

The new battle-field for the Little Irish grid teams will be ready before school opens next Fall according to the James Stewart Construction Company of New York City which will carry out the plans of Architect Frank M. Quinlan. Built of concrete in horseshoe shape the new arena will seat "over 20,000 people."

In the past two seasons 273,000 football fans have jammed the Red Wing Stadium for 16 Aquinas games. Facing the toughest schedule in the school's history and awaiting the appointment of a new coach to succeed Harry Wright, recently removed to the University of Portland, Oregon, Aquinas rosters expect to fill the stadium regularly.

Ground for the new stadium, totalling 18 acres to provide parking facilities, was purchased from the City of Rochester in August 1948. The funds for building the stadium as a memorial to Aquinas graduates who died in World War II were raised by public subscription three years ago by members of the Aquinas Men's Club.

A state-wide Catholic War Veteran spiritual bouquet for His Holiness, Pope Pius XII in observance of the Holy Father's 50th anniversary of ordination on Sunday, April 2 will enlist members in Monroe County according to Edward W. Esse county commander.

All local posts will hold individual Communion Masses on that morning, Esse states.

The spiritual bouquet is a project of the New York State Department, Catholic War Veterans.

STATE OFFICERS in their appeal to members to join in the devotion have emphasized that it will constitute a reply to Premier Stalin's question "How Many Divisions Does the Pope Have?"

Department Commander Paul J. Dolan in announcing the state-wide Communion of veterans stresses the challenge presented by Premier Stalin which, he declares, shows the need for militant Catholic action to check the inroads of Godless totalitarianism.
