Mrs. Cuddy Talks Mission History Recorded On Sex Films To Canandaigua CDA

Auburn—Mrs. Joseph Cuddy, president of Auburn Deaconry Council, National Council of Catholic Women, discussed the problems facing the parents of teenage children before members of Court Canandaigua, Catholic Daughters of America.

Mrs. Cuddy stated in part: "Sex education in the schools places an unjust emphasis upon a natural and sacred function which should be relegated to the background of every day development and to the sanctity of the home."

"THE SHOWING of the films 'Human Growth' and 'Human Reproduction' could be a source of shock and sensuality even to the senior in high school. The Catholic Church does not condemn the films. Shown to adults and to parents whose natural right and duty it is to guide and instruct their children along the lines of sex education they may have value."

But sex education in order to be effective must be related to morality. Religion is the basis of morality and religion is God and His message to us. And God and His message to us can not be taught in the public schools."

St. Monica School To Be Blessed By Bishop On Easter

Blessing by His Excellency Bishop Kearney of the new wing of St. Monica's School will take place Easter Sunday, April 17 at 4 p. m. with parishioners and friends of the school participating.

Preceding the dedication will be a procession from the rectory on Monica St. to the main entrance of the school on Genesee St., according to the Very Rev. Gerald C. Lambert, pastor.

In line will be the St. Monica's school band, Boy Scouts, delegations of the Holy Name Society, the Rosary and Allar Society, Monticans, Legion of Mary and the Sodality.

ESCORTING THE Bishop will be priests of the diocese, diocesan officials, representatives of the diocesan school board and monsignori.

During the dedicatory ceremony, the Bishop will bless and erect the crucifix in the main school corridor.

The Bishop and party will return to the church to take part in the customary Miraculous Medal services after which the Bishop will speak on the occasion.

Costing in the neighborhood of \$500,000 the new school addition will be the fourth school to be blessed by Bishop Kearney during the present school year.

IN THE MODERNLY equipped and constructed building are 13 classrooms, including art, nurse's room, principal's office, kindergarten, lunch room, meeting room and scout room.

The new addition will provide a kindergarten, one first grade, one third grade and two 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th grades.

In the old school where the other grades will be conducted will also be a room for audio-visual education and the library. There are also two vocal rooms in the old school.

The portable structure now in front of the school's main entrance will be torn down.

With a registration of 800 pupils including 140 in the kindergarten and 140 in the three last grades the school is taught by 20 Sisters of St. Joseph.
