200 Boy Sopranos To Feature Festival Of Music Slated By Our Catholic Schools

A vested boys soprano choir of 200 voices from Rochester parochial schools will share the spotlights of the Eastman Theater with glee clubs from four high schools when Catholic schools of the Rochester area present their first annual Music Festival next Wednesday evening May 25, at 8.15 p.m.

Designed to show the scope of musical training being presented in Catholic schools of the diocese, the program of orchestral, instrumental and vocal music is expected to draw a capacity crowd.

Tickets will not be sold at the Eastman Theater, the Diocesan schools office announced, but must be purchased in advance from the schools or at the Columbus Civic Center lobby.

Featured in the Music Festival program will be the Perosian Choir of Nazareth Academy, the Mercy High School Glee Club, the Academy of the Sacred Heart Chorus and the Aquinas Glee Club. Each group will present a program of six songs.

Women's Lack Of Zeal Deplored By Mrs. Mannix

Only lack of zeal in spreading the truth among Catholic women of the world from Communism, Mrs. Henry W. Mannix of Rochester, president of the National Council of Catholic Women, told nearly 300 DCCW members at Rochester Tuesday night.

Pleading that "Catholic women have the same consultant status in the United Nations as do Communist women," Mrs. Mannix, principal speaker at the monthly meeting of the Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women in Columbus Civic Center ballroom, noted that Catholics do not have the corresponding degree of zeal.

THUS far 700 much compromise with the so-called "right people," she said, many of whom are espousing a "liberal attitude" which saps the path of various "isms." "We should remember," the speaker commented, "that the really 'right people' are the people close to God."

Scoring currently distributed "sex education" film for showing to high school pupils, Mrs. Mannix said they are "dangerous, pagan, coldly scientific." They offend "the finer sensibilities," she contended, and most of all "completely ignore God, the author of life and of the soul in human reproduction."

Mrs. Mannix, who represents the NCCW on the International Federation of Catholic Women and in such capacity has visited Europe four times, recently urged her listeners to "give your heart, your understanding and your love" to displaced persons. She said the Holy Father, with whom she had a private audience, expressed "deep concern for the DPs."

She also lauded as a very necessary work the marriage preparation courses being sponsored by Catholic Women in the NCCW.

Both the Rev. Albert J. Sham, DCCW moderator, and the Rev. John T. Callahan, Diocesan Council moderator, expressed appreciation of the women for Mrs. Mannix' visit. Featuring the meeting was a program of songs presented by the Catholic Women's Club Chorus under direction of Mrs. Marie Kober Burbank. Mrs. Leo F. Mucke, Diocesan president, presided.

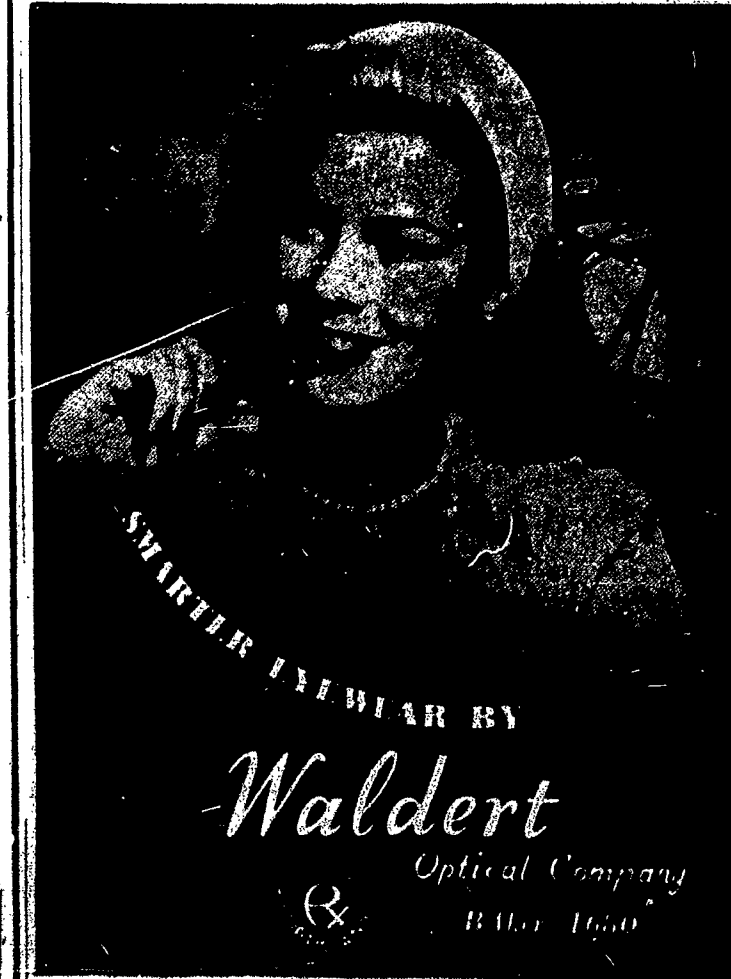
