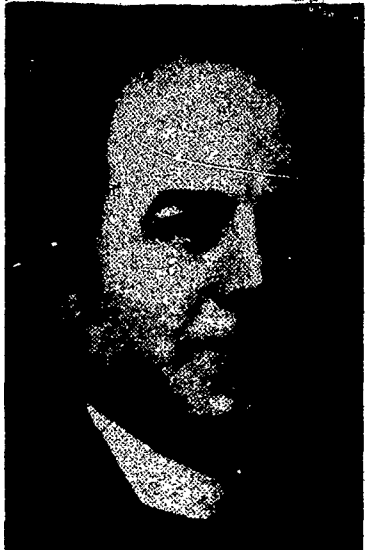

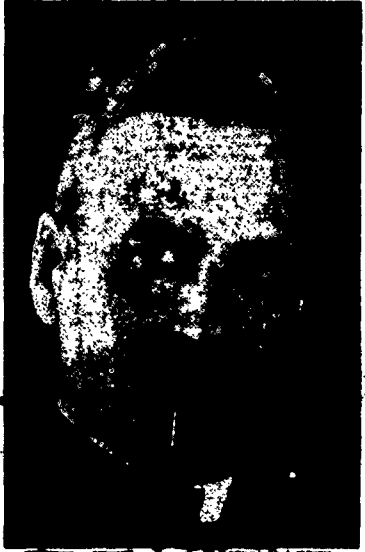

## Cure Claimed At Fatima

Fatima, Portugal —(NC)— Among the 800 sick pilgrims present at the Fatima shrine on May 13 for solemn ceremonies marking the 32nd anniversary of the first apparition of the Blessed Virgin here, three were reportedly cured.

This correspondent personally witnessed a 25-year-old Portuguese girl, who had been bedridden for five years with spinal tuberculosis, stand up immediately after the blessing of the sick with the Blessed Sacrament by American Bishop Sidney M. Metzger of El Paso, Texas.

The girl later walked to the medical bureau where doctors examined her and expressed satisfaction at her condition.

## St. Bernard's 1949 Ordination Class Will Serve Seven Dioceses in U.S.

### Rochester To Get Twelve New Priests

The 1949 Ordination Class of St. Bernard's Seminary includes thirty-four young men who will be ordained priests for service in seven different dioceses of the United States, including that of the Diocese of Rochester.

Besides the Diocese of Rochester, other dioceses which will receive St. Bernard-trained priests from the current Ordination Class are: Diocese of Albany; Diocese of Syracuse; Diocese of Ogdensburg; Diocese of Buffalo; Diocese of Hartford, Conn.; Diocese of Tucson, Arizona; Diocese of Savannah-Atlanta, Ga.; and the Diocese of Altoona, Pa.

First members of this year's class to be elevated to the Holy Priesthood are eleven students of the Diocese of Hartford, Connecticut. They will be ordained today (May 26) in St. Joseph's Cathedral, Hartford, by Bishop Henry J. O'Brien. One Hartford student will also be ordained for the Diocese of Tucson, Arizona.

TWENTY-ONE members of the class, including students of Rochester Diocese will be ordained next month in their own diocesan Cathedrals.

Among this group are thirteen Rochester diocesan students, two of whom will be assigned to work in other dioceses following ordination by His Excellency Bishop Kearney June 11 in the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart.

Two Syracuse students, four from Albany and one of Ogdensburg will be ordained in their respective Cathedrals, June 11. Two students of the Diocese of Buffalo, also in the '49 class, have a half year more of study and will be ordained in December.

### Msgr. Burns To Fly Home For Vacation

The Very Rev. Msgr. Richard K. Burns, vice-rector of the North American College in Rome and native of Rochester, N. Y., will leave there by plane Friday for a two months vacation in the United States, according to a cable received from the Rev. Joseph J. Sullivan, NCWC correspondent in Rome.

Monsignor Burns is expected to reach New York on Saturday and to arrive in Rochester on Sunday.

Recently named a Papal Chamberlain by Pope Pius XII, Monsignor Burns was a member of the faculty of St. Bernard's Seminary before his assignment to Rome in January, 1946, as a secretary of the Oriental Congregation. He was appointed vice-rector of the North American College in March, 1947.

### Notre Dame Converts Start 'Share-The-Faith' Group

Notre Dame, Ind. — (NC) — A Share-the-Faith Club was launched at the University of Notre Dame as a class of nine converts was received into the Church by the Rev. John A. O'Brien, religion teacher and widely-known lecturer. Acting as sponsors were other converts, among them two former Protestant ministers now on the school faculty.

PROFESSOR HENRY C. Stanton, of the English Department, a convert from the Episcopal ministry, urged the members to deepen their knowledge of the Catholic religion so they will be more competent spokesmen of the Faith.

History Professor Wilbur Nutting, a former Anglican minister, emphasized the importance of understanding the Church's liturgy and of explaining it properly to non-Catholic visitors at the services of the Church. Professor A. J. MacAlpin, head of the Department of Geology, another convert, pointed out the importance of achieving personal sanctity.

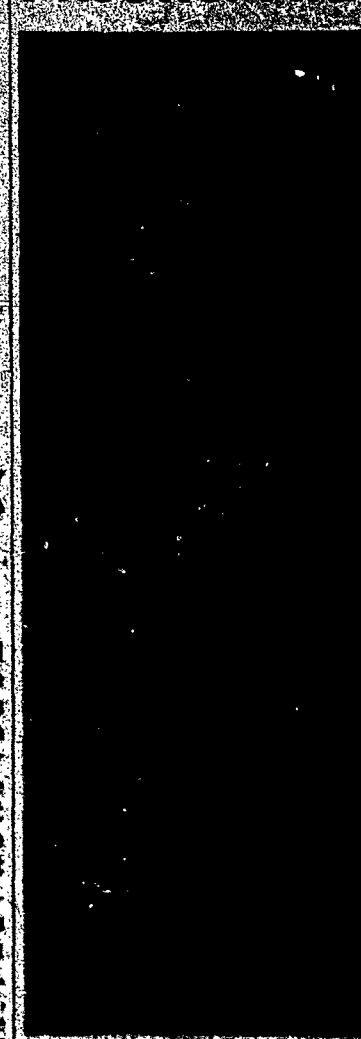
The priest, after administering Holy Communion to her, understood from her plaints that her parents did not want her to go to Holy Communion.

Bishop Kearney will be interviewed on WHEC Sunday at 1 p.m.

Original plans of postponing his trip to Rome for the return voyage home were dropped last week when the ship sailed in advance of schedule.

## College To Honor Mary A. Sheehan

Miss Mary A. Sheehan, principal of Rochester's Mount Holy School, and one of New York State's best known educators, will be awarded an honorary Doctor of Education at Nazareth College Commencement June 6, college officials have announced.

A FASHIONER of Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral, Miss Sheehan has distinguished herself in state and national educational circles. First woman ever to hold post of principal in a Rochester public high school, she is also one of only two women ever elected president of the New York State Teachers' Association, oldest and largest teaching organization in the world.

Miss Sheehan is a graduate of the former Cathedral High School in Rochester and the College of St. Elizabeth at Convent Station, N. Y. She began her teaching career in Rochester and was named principal of Washington High School in 1921.

WHEN THE Washington School was dissolved in 1931, she became vice-principal of Mount Holy School. Her appointment as principal came in 1934.
