### Father Peyton Talks To Genevans

Interested in spending his life as a missionary among the Hindus, Mohammedans, or Gairos of the Diocese of Dacca. He was sent to the Foreign Mission seminary, but as he says, "God had different designs." He was stricken with a severe case of tuberculosis.

His cure, which puzzled medical authorities, he attributes to the intercession of Mary, the Mother of God, to whom he prayed for a return to health. His friends made novenas of Masses, novenas, and prayers for him during his illness.

"Because of Our Lady's motherly care and help during that great crisis, I felt that I owed her a debt I could never repay. I prayed that I could spend the rest of my life endeavoring to repay her for her goodness and kindness to me," Father Peyton related.

Father Peyton is thinking the Mother of God, by trying to secure ten million "American Rosary novenas."

"I have tried," he said, "to profit by every modern method of salesmanship. Now in addition to the use of the press, the pulpit, radio, and outdoor advertising, we are adding another great medium—the movies."

"The Family Theatre slogan 'the family that prays together, stays together,' has 'caught on,' Father Peyton said.

The program has won prominent space in newspapers and national magazines. Outdoor advertising has become another medium. A large Los Angeles sign was first to help popularize the slogan by erecting a large colored, illuminated sign over the entrance to the city.

Father Peyton says that "it can be read from a great distance." Similar painted billboards are being erected in many of the larger cities of the nation.

"God and His Mother Mary have blessed our efforts and helped our progress," he concluded.
