3 Priests Give Sermon to Deaf Simultaneously

Three priests at the same time delivered a sermon to the same audience of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing of Rochester on Sunday May 29 at St. Frances DeSales Chapel, Franklin St., Rochester.

Occasion was the closing of the Deaf Mission. The Very Rev. John Prosser, C.S.S.R., pastor of St. Joseph's Church, delivered a sermon orally to those using hearing aids, the Rev. Stephen Landherr, C.S.S.R., Ph.D., Chaplain of the Deaf of Philadelphia interpreted Father Prosser's sermon in the sign language for the adult deaf. The Rev. John B. Gallagher, C.S.S.R., Chaplain of the Deaf of Buffalo and Rochester interpreted Father Prosser's words in the manual alphabet to the deaf children.

This is believed to be the first time in the history of the Church in the United States that three priests preached the same sermon at the same time to the same audience.

A CAPACITY CONGREGATION witnessed the closing of the Deaf Mission and the reception of the First Holy Communion by 12 children from the Rochester School for the Deaf. The mission was sponsored by the Redemptorist Fathers who have undertaken the work for the deaf as one of the special missionary activities.

After the services in the church, the deaf and hard of hearing were guests at a breakfast served in St. Joseph's School Hall under the chairmanship of Mr. and Mrs. John Kowalski and Frank Crimmins. At the breakfast, twelve girls from Nazareth College, who helped teach the deaf children, religion during the school year, sang popular songs, which were interpreted for the deaf by Father Landherr and Father Gallagher in the sign language and the manual alphabet.

The services for the deaf and hard of hearing will continue every first and third Sunday in St. Frances DeSales Chapel at 9:15 a. m.

Bishop Commends College On Jubilee For Teaching 'Whole Christian Life'

Nazareth College has earned the gratitude of Church and nation for its quarter century of teaching "the whole Christian life." His Excellency Bishop Kearney declared at the Silver Jubilee ceremonies of the college last Sunday.

Speaking at the Solemn High Mass attended by several hundred alumnae and the present student body, the Bishop said: "For twenty-five years Nazareth College has lived out the command of Our Lord to teach His children by showing 'the way and the truth and the life' which is Christ.

In the name of the Rochester Circle of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae the Bishop also gave Sister Teresa Marie a new scholarship named in her honor which annually will pay \$100 tuition for a student chosen from public high schools of the Rochester area.

IN 1924 Sister Teresa Marie Kearney headed the high school of the college administration and the devotion to Christian perfection which has marked its policies.

"In spreading the ideals of Christ," he said, "Nazareth College has been a true mother in teaching 'the way and the truth and the life'.

"She has insisted that the true way to happiness and peace is God's way—His law of virtue and obedience and perfection.

"In an age of unbridled intellectual freedom and disputed standards of truth, she has unflinchingly given her students the firm, guaranteed truths of the teaching of Christ.

"Building the campus spiritual life around the living presence of Christ in the chapel, Nazareth has shown her daughters the perfect beauty and security of the Christ-life."

Reviewing the history of the college Bishop Kearney paid tribute to the vision and courage of the late Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey and the community of the Sisters of Saint Joseph who founded the school in 1924 at the Glass House on Lake Avenue.

THE BISHOP praised the spreading influence of Nazareth graduates in the family life of every parish in the diocese and in career positions throughout the country.

"The most precious gift Nazareth College has given her daughters for twenty-five years," he said, "is the Christ-life she has built in their souls. Her graduates have carried the Christian message of the teaching of Christ to the far corners of the world and have inspired from her graduates in their homes and careers for the (Continued on Page 2-A)

Firms Aid In Playground Opened In St. Bridget's

Hemmed in by railroad tracks and busy Rochester streets where death recently crushed a little boy, St. Bridget's school children are a dozen blocks from safe and spacious playfield.

This week a drab, vacant lot near the school became a busy playground as children of the parish swarmed into a long needed play-center created by generous neighbors and parishioners to keep the youngsters out of crowded neighborhood streets.

THE COOPERATIVE action began when Bohn Machinery Co. and the Rochien Engraving Co. offered the Rev. Leo Ward, assistant pastor at St. Bridget's, the use of a 20x10 foot lot on Ward Street off Clinton Ave. for the school children's use.

He canvassed parishioners and neighboring merchants for donations to convert the lot into a playground and in a few days had found a bulldozer to grade the land and 35 loads of dirt from the YWCA excavations to level it.

Assisted by Anthony Aquilina and Alex. Sigmonini, Father Ward contacted Falcone and Son, Co. who donated a backstop for the new ball diamond and the Falk Machinery Co. who offered other play installations.

"The next needs are a basketball court and volleyball area," Father Ward told the Courier-Journal this week.

"We would welcome some donor who could give us the bangboards and hoops for basketball or the poles for the volleyball net. And then we are going to start looking for a big bus to take our kids to the beach and into the country this summer."
