(Continued from page 7) "We build monuments to them. We revere their memory. We remember them vividly on occasions like this. The wounds that their passing left in human hearts have mercifully become scars."

"WE TRY NOT to forget their parents, their wives and their children. Their memory, then, is imperishable. The generations to come may forget the names of individual heroes, but Guadalupe, Midway, Tarawa and Iwo Jima, Normandy and the Bulge will not be forgotten."

"While it is true that they are not forgotten, and will never be forgotten, sometimes the reasons why they died are passed over or forgotten. Justice and Freedom are mighty ideals. They cannot be preserved unless we are always prepared to defend them and die for them. But it

takes more than might to bring peace to this world. When a strong man armed keeps his camp no robber of robbery nation will bother him. But the hostile camp is always there with its camp fires ever glowing. It might as one overcome it. It swarms another. It may become by Justice and Liberty."

"AN WE STAND in spirit with the beloved dead of our wars, let us see if they might not have a message for us. Are the memorials that we build to them alone what they stand for? Can buildings and statues and plaques build the world that they desired for themselves and their children? Can stone and mortar reward them for the expending of heart and mind and body?"

"Can building strong bodies and educated minds in the children of America in their memory bring Peace to the world and so to our nation? Rather they would tell us that it takes spiritual strength to face the cannons' roar and to slay savage seas. A spiritual America can remain free. An America concerned only with material strength of science can only go on to doom."

"They stand now side by side along their enemies and look sorrowfully upon a world that is very close to forgetting them; a world that is living in forget the horror of war is forgetting what made these men great; a world forgetting that heroism and its reward comes only out of sacrifice."

"THERE IS A STORY told of a scientist who was interested in the habits of butterflies. He was so sympathetic with the small butterfly trying to liberate itself from its cocoon that he helped by slitting the cocoon with his knife. That butterfly was never able to use its wings. Would they not tell us if they could, that charity, just sacrifice, worship of God now, could be our finest insurance against sacrifice on the barbarian altar of war later?"

"As we close our memento of the dead may we pay the last tribute to their memory, by remembering that no matter how great their deeds of valor no matter how inspiring their death, they are still our brothers in Christ, subject to the same penalties that we are and that they may still need our help in paying their last debt before coming into possession of that everlasting peace for which they lived and died."

"Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen."

"These are the men of America who counted life a small price for Freedom, Justice and Democracy, not only for themselves but for their children, the Americans of tomorrow."

"IN A WORLD of confusion, and this is not the only generation that has been confused, they were sure that the Stars and Stripes was a worthy symbol, and, therefore, a banner to be followed through hardship, sacrifice, misery and blood to victory, or even defeat."

"The defeats have been exceptions, the victories many thanks be to God, but the outstanding fact remains that, win or lose these Americans not only loved themselves but sealed the offering by their death through their sacrifice endure."

"Millions of Americans have made that offering, not only those who donned the uniform of our country, but the people as a whole who deservedly are ranked with the man behind the gun. But, today, for a moment we pause and as we look back upon the bloody roads that led to today and the spirits that, in our imagination, haunt them all before us and focus our attention upon them."
