

### 2 German Priests Arrive To Study Diocesan Schools

Two German priests whose job is to aid in democratization of their native Germany are in Rochester this week to study the Catholic Schools at the request of the United States Military Government, Religious Affairs Branch.

Under the direction of the Rev. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney, Superintendent of Rochester Diocesan Catholic Schools, they are observing school administration.

THE PRIESTS, Rev. Dr. Friedrich Doer, and Rev. Theodor Lotz, arrived from Detroit Tuesday afternoon. They will stay over until Sunday afternoon when they will depart for Boston to pursue their study of the American Catholic school systems.

While in Rochester, they are being conducted on a tour of Catholic elementary and high schools by the Rev. Charles V. Boyle, Associate Superintendent, who speaks German fluently. Both Father Doer and Father Lotz, however, speak good English. They are also visiting typical American homes and institutions.

Father Doer, who comes from Bavaria, is a professor of Theology and Pedagogy at Philosophisch-Theologische Hochschule at Elchstadt in Germany His companion, Father Lotz, who comes from Opladen-Rheinland, is a former Army chaplain, who was a prisoner of war under the Allies. He became well-known during imprisonment as camp leader and formed a youth group of prisoners, building up the first information room for education. In 1947, he was sent to England to study the young people, educational methods and organizations. The following year he attended the world youth congress of the United Nations in London.

Sponsoring the tours of these priests and others who will visit America under the same program is the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

The program was launched by the U. S. Military Government because, according to the official statement issued this summer, "Religious institutions are recognized as a significant element in the social structure of Germany and the values inherent in the moral and spiritual resources of the German people are recognized as essential to the realization of this (re-education) program."

Fr. Cirrincione To Lead Pilgrims To Fatima Shrine

Rev. Joseph Cirrincione, Pastor of St. Francis of Assisi Church, Rochester, will lead a pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Blessed Mother at Fatima in August. "Father Joe" was in Fatima in May 1948 and visited Sister Lucy with her confessor, His Excellency, Manuel, Bishop of Gurza.

While in Fatima "Father Joe" obtained a statue of Our Lady made by the Thedim which was taken to Rome and blessed by the Holy Father.

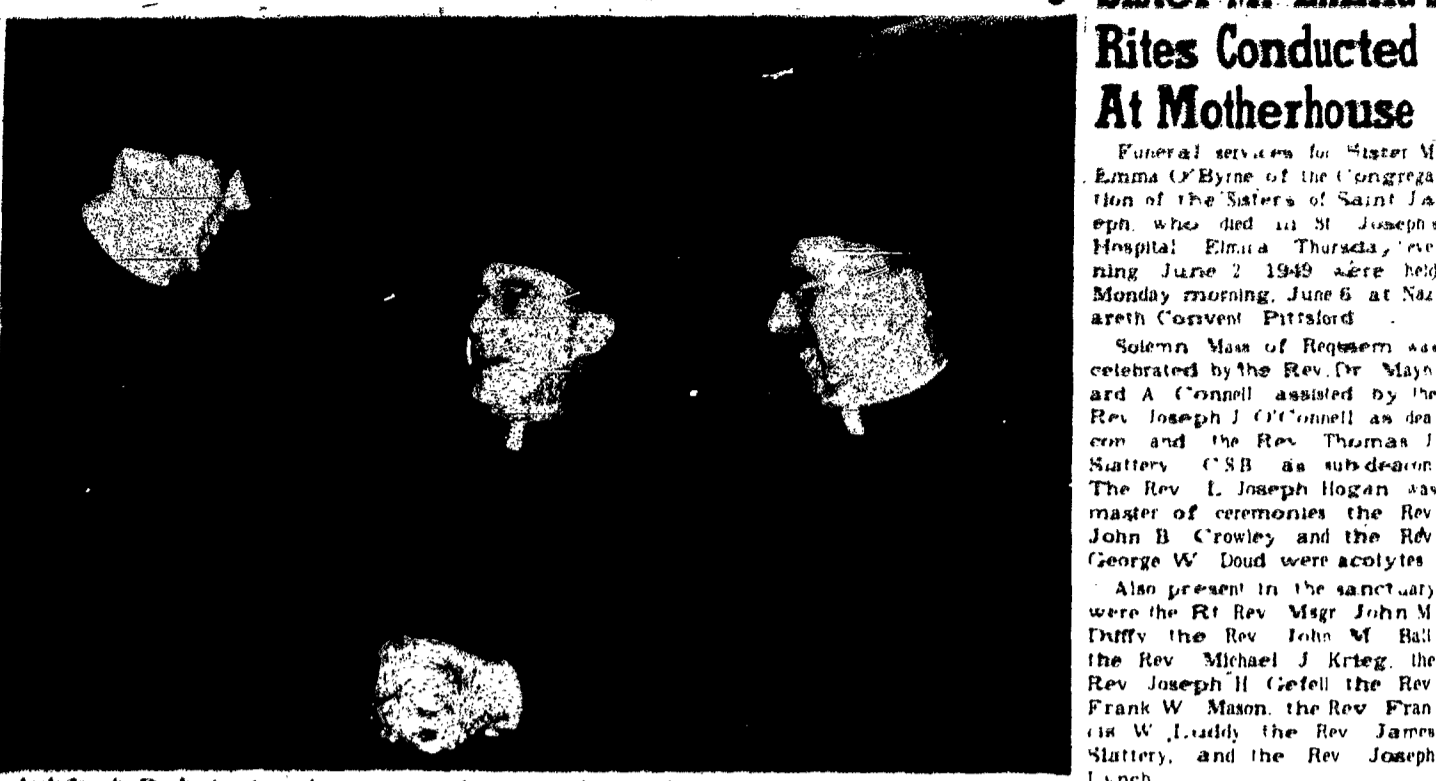
Father Cirrincione spent many months broadcasting Our Lady's Message from Rochester and is one of the leading authorities on Fatima in this country.

After assisting in the August 13th devotionals at the Covadonga where Our Lady appeared, pilgrims will travel to Rome to be received by the Holy Father before visiting Lourdes and the Shrine of the Miraculous Medal in Paris.

Pilgrims from all parts of the United States assembling at Fatima in August will be joined by some three hundred pilgrims from Ireland and England. This great pilgrimage will form the largest English speaking group ever to assist in the celebrations at Fatima and has been organized by the Dublin, London and Washington offices of the International Catholic Travel Service whose headquarters are in Washington, D.C.

The Irish contingent will be arriving in Portugal in three specially chartered flying boats from Dublin.

### Canisius Grads Told Measure Of Education

"The good effects of your Christian education will be measured only in terms of how much service you can give to society," the Rev. Dr. Charles J. Mahoney, Superintendent of Rochester Diocesan Schools, told graduates of Canisius College in his baccalaureate address Saturday in Buffalo.

Pointing out that love of God depends on how much you love your neighbor, Doctor Mahoney reminded the class "You have not been educated and prepared for the society of the Social Register, but you have been educated for the society of this Twentieth Century bedeviled by social and economic ills for which Christian social principles are the sole remedy."

The Rochester educator warned the young men that economic achievement should not be the sole criterion of success and called upon them to examine thoroughly the particular profession or vocation which they had chosen to find out how they could best serve God and society. He appealed to them not to allow their youthful idealism to be sullied by their adult environment.

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School children presenting an entertainment also made him a gift of a beautiful surprise.

The school song to St. Anne written by Mrs. Frank Kaser, director of the Senior Choir opened the program. Pupils of Mrs. Martin Samerling Fay sang a solo tap number.

The Zener spoke in behalf of the parishioners expressing appreciation to Father Schmitt and small Peter Mykity of the first grade presented the purse.

The choir sang the "Panna Angelus" by Cesare Franck. Solo was sung by General Chairman Mrs. Frank Orsini. A reception and refreshments followed.
