### Fr. Boyle Named To Represent NCWC at Meeting

Appointment of the Rev. Charles V. Boyle of the Rochester diocese as official representative of the National Catholic Welfare Conference to the World Conference of Teacher Education and Professional Standards is announced today.

The appointment was made by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Frederick G. Hochwalt, director of the N.C.W.C. Department of Education, Washington. Father Boyle is assistant superintendent, Catholic Schools, Diocese of Rochester.

The conference is a continuation of the one held last year at Oxford, England. This year's meeting will be held at the University of New Hampshire from June 27 to July 3.

Five hundred key educators each officially designated by his own organization will participate.

Following the conference, Father Boyle will spend the summer at Fordham University in post-graduate study.

### Bishop To Dedicate New Chapel At Villa

St. Thomas Chapel on the grounds of St. Joseph's Villa will be dedicated to the memory of Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey, second Bishop of Rochester, by His Excellency Bishop Kearney on Tuesday morning, June 28, at 10 o'clock.

Bishop Kearney will celebrate Mass in the beautiful little chapel, which was fashioned from a former workshop near the entrance of the grounds, Dewey Ave. Street.

Attending the Mass will be the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Gerald C. Lambert, Director of Rochester Catholic Charities, the Rev. Austin R. Harris, Villa chaplain and Mr. and Mrs. Jeremiah G. Hickey. The Mass will begin at 8 a.m.

A statue building, the chapel has pews of oak and a Communion rail and sanctuary lamp of wrought iron. The altar is of triptych style, as designated because the statue is made in three panels. Decoration was inspired by Bishop Kearney and carries out a theme appropriate for the children of the Villa.

SET INTO the Gothic parvise front of the altar table is a reproduction of the Infant Christ and the central feature is the triptych panel is a picture of Christ blessing the little children. The side panels carry the standard arms of two past Bishops of Rochester.

St. Joseph's Villa, a college-type home for dependent boys and girls, was opened on Dewey Avenue when the children from St. Mary's and St. Patrick's houses were moved there June 28, 1947.

Negotiations for the Villa were started by Monsignor Lambert Oct. 7, 1947. The Villa has become nationally known and was featured in "Church Property Administration" two years later with an photograph and an article by Monsignor Lambert.
