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Jesuit Gives Technique for Lessening Domestic Discord

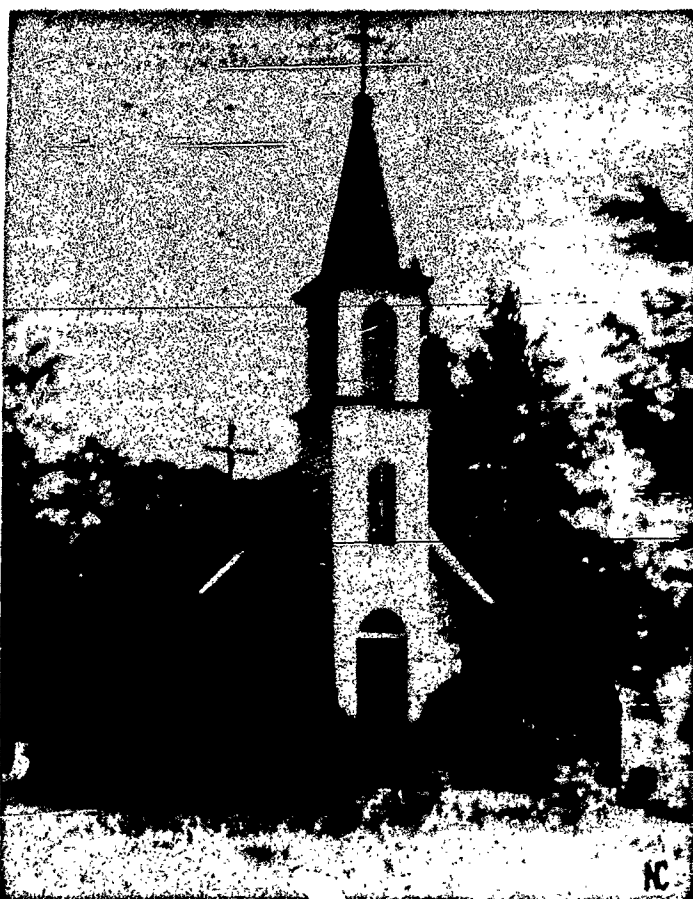
New York (NC)—A booklet entitled "An Examination of Conscience for Married Couples" was suggested as a means of stopping domestic discord by the Rev. Daniel J. Higgins, S.J., of St. Louis University, in a nationwide radio broadcast here.

"Let's say that 50 per cent of the family problems come from Mr. and 50 per cent from Mrs. Now Mr. is probably doomed to failure if he tries to correct in Mrs. the faults which give rise to her 50 per cent," the priest explained on the Faith In Our Time program, carried by the Mutual Broadcasting System.

"40 to 50 PER CENT of the difficulty he may not be able to or at least better not try to touch directly and uninvited, but he has a wonderful opportunity of correcting the 50 per cent that comes from himself," Father Higgins said.

"He need only be humble enough to face the facts, admit his shortcomings, and have the courage to do something about correcting them."

German Named To Jerusalem's Abbey

Cologne (NC)—The Rt. Rev. Pius Buddenberg, Abbot of the Benedictine Abbey of St. Joseph Gerleve, Westphalia, has been appointed Abbot-Administrator of the Dormition Abbey of Jerusalem by the Sacred Congregation of the Affairs of Religious. The Abbey, which suffered heavily during the recent fighting, is located on Mount Zion, on the spot where the Blessed Virgin is said to have been taken into heaven.

Raleigh, N. C.—(NC)—The Rev. Thomas McGlynn, O.P., world-famous sculptor, has been commissioned to make a statue of Our Lady to be given by the Catholics of America to the Fatima Basilica in Portugal.

The California-born Dominican will leave for Italy in October to begin work on the figure.

HE WILL USE Carrara marble, quarried in Tuscany, and when the statue is nearly completed he will take it to Portugal to apply the finishing touches. It will be placed over the main entrance to the basilica in an 18-foot niche, 50 feet above the ground.

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Annulment Cases Reported by Rota

Vatican City (NC)—The Sacred Rota has rendered decisions in 124 cases concerning the nullity of marriages and one concerning permanent separation during the year 1948, according to the record published in the current issue—No. 6—of the Acta Apostolicae Sedis.

Of these judgments, 48 were decided in favor of the pre-existing nullity of marriage, 76 against nullity or in favor of a valid marriage.

Egypt Extends Holy Year Pilgrims Special Facilities

Cairo, Egypt (NC)—The Egyptian government will offer special facilities to Holy Year pilgrims who wish to extend their journey from Rome to Egypt, a Foreign Office spokesman has informed the Papal Internunciature here.

"The Holy Year offers us a unique opportunity to show the spiritual and historical importance of Egypt in the Bible to pilgrims going to Rome," Hassan Maher, an official of the Foreign Office, said.

"IT IS THEREFORE the intention of the Egyptian Government to participate actively in the Holy Year celebration by granting every facility to pilgrims wishing to visit Egypt."

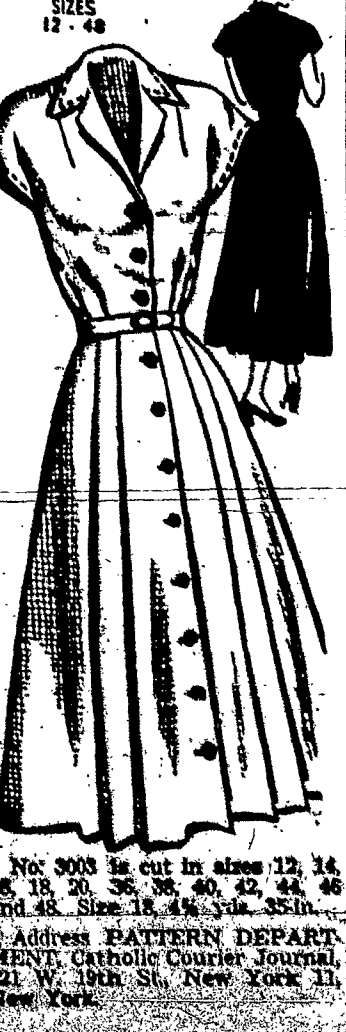
"The government intends thus to underscore the friendly relations which were established between Islam and the Holy See and to show its appreciation of the Christian contribution to Egyptian civilization."
