couragement should be given to religious practice and full liberty should be accorded in matters of religious conscience and practice.

ISSUES ALMOST lost sight of in the heat of the Barden Federal Aid to Education controversy, the former chaplain at Simpson College declared are "the undermining of the principle of parental rights in the education of their children as recognized by the Supreme Court in the famous Oregon decision of 1925, and the discrimination against American children-citizens."

Representative Taber's opposition to the bill was for reasons of economy and opposition to federal encroachment. These are political reasons, "open to honest debate," Father Cuddy stated. The Church's opposition is for reason for its unjust discrimination.
