Lady Columnist's Stand Deplored By Fr. Cuddy

Auburn — The Rev. Paul J. Cuddy, a native of Auburn, and a former Catholic Chaplain in the U. S. Army, deplored as "unfortunate that a distinguished lady columnist (Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt) raised the objection to federal benefits to all children on the grounds of preserving the American tradition of Separation of Church and State."

Women's Role In World Told At NCCW Meet

Auburn — The apostolate of the hierarchy of the Church cannot be fulfilled except through the laity, was the challenge given Auburn Deaconess National Council of Catholic Women by the Rev. Albert J. 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Pittsford Parish Buys Site For Planned Church, School

Plans for a future new church building and a modern school for St. Louis parish, Pittsford, were being discussed this week following purchase of an historic mansion on three acres of Main Street property.

For the present, according to the Rev. Louis W. Edelman, pastor, the 14-year-old brick mansion, which probably will be the future rectory, will be used for a Sunday school.

LOCATED ONE block south of the village center, the estate is famed as a refuge for runaway slaves in the days of the "underground railroad" during the Civil War.

Portions of the house first erected in 1806 by the Guernsey family and later added to by Augustus Elliott. Some three decades ago it came into possession of the Hargrove family, prominent members of New York's "Four Hundred," who used it as a summer residence, giving it renown as a social center famed for its luxurious parties and weddings.

One of the outstanding examples of colonial architecture in the region, its last owners were Mr. and Mrs. George N. Lenz, who bought it some three years ago from Mr. and Mrs. Theodore C. Briggs.

Through the years several architects have come long distances to inspect the village landmark. All of its interior woodwork and fixtures were brought at tremendous expense from Albany by canal to Geneva and the remainder of the way by train.

FOR NEARLY 35 years Sisters of Mercy have been teaching Sunday school classes in religion for children of the parish. Four Sisters now conduct the hour-long classes on Sunday mornings. Many of the parish children attend Blessed Sacrament school.

Father Edelman, pastor of the 85-year-old parish for the last 25 years, long has felt the need for a larger church building for the growing numbers of parishioners. The present building at 33 State Street is only 27 feet wide by 60 feet deep and seats only 200 persons. There are no Sunday Masses.

Last year the parish erected a mission — Immaculate Heart of Mary Chapel — in Bushnell Hall, where one Mass is celebrated every Sunday.

Purchase of the new Main Street property was handled through the Rochester Realty Company.

A plaque marking the centennial celebration of the founding of Holy Name of Mary, the first Catholic Church in Algeria, a suburb of New Orleans will be dedicated.

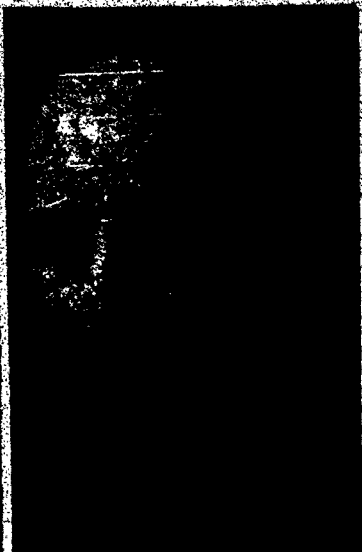
Hurling, Gaelic football, baseball, other Irish and American games and races for both young and old are included in the program.
