653 Children Enjoy Stay At Camp Stella Maris

Camp Stella Maris, operated by Rochester Catholic Charities on Conesus Lake, completes its 23rd year as a vacation resort for diocesan children on Aug. 27.

The final encampment marks the end of the camp's regular eight-week season.

Since July 3rd there have been 2 one-week encampments and 2 two-week encampments for the boys, and 2 one-week encampments for the girls. In all, a total of 653 children participated in the camping program. The campers' ages ranged from nine to fifteen.

A STAFF OF 15 counselors and a maintenance crew of five, all students of St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's Seminaries, assisted the Rev. Donald J. Mulcahy, Camp Director, in carrying out the summer's program.

Paul Morgan of Rochester acted as head counselor during the six-week boys' period, and Mary Hannick, also of Rochester, acted as head counselor during the girls' period. Miss Hannick was assisted in her work by a staff composed of college and high school girls of the Rochester area.

For the fourth consecutive year the duties in the kitchen, chapel, and infirmary were ably handled by the Sisters of Mercy.

Philippines Will Fight Against Reds, Says President Quirino

New York — (NC) — The best hope of conquering communism lies "in the internal renewal of Christianity and democracy," declared President Elpidio Quirino of the Philippine Republic, on the occasion of accepting an honorary Doctorate of Laws from Fordham University here.

The president of the University, the Very Rev. Laurence J. McGinley, S.J., conferred the degree. The Rev. Pacifico A. Ortiz, S.J., former chaplain to the late President Manuel Quezon, pronounced the invocation and His Eminence—Francis Cardinal Spellman the benediction.

PRESIDENT QUIRINO emphasized in his acceptance speech that the Philippine Republic was "the only Christian state in the Far East," and this fact, he said, gives the Philippines a special responsibility in the defense of democracy against communism in the East, just as the United States has a special responsibility "as leader of the Christian states of the West."

Referring to his proposal for a Pacific Union of Southeast Asian nations which he first advanced last month after a conference with China's Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, he told an audience of distinguished guests on the university campus

that the Philippine people will resist with all their strength "the evil thing that is now striving to enslave men and nations under a tyranny more ruthless than any other in history."

THE PHILIPPINE Republic, promised Quirino, will fight the spread of communism in the Far East "with the support and comradeship of friendly peoples if possible, alone if necessary."

He stressed the importance of religious faith "that can level the mountains of hate and violence that a totalitarian system now on a rampage has raised up among men and nations."
