 and graders hold their pens. Sister Bright, a member of the Sisters of Mercy, has 25 pupils in the first grade and 20 in the second.

A sister who has taught every grade in elementary school, many of them double, for the past 11 years, is Sister M. Edwards, F.S.M.J., of the Franciscan Sisters of St. Joseph at St. Theresa's School, Rochester.

"I've grown up with these youngsters," Sister Edwards commented. "We started out together in the first grade and advanced together, learning and teaching at once."

Now teaching seventh and eighth graders, she was noted that girls "always like school better" but the boys are "good sports" about it and take discipline without hard feelings. Many of the girls hate to be out of school even over holidays, she said, and seem overjoyed to be back after summer vacation.

She deplored the poor discipline of children whose parents both work. "You have to start from scratch with them. They haven't any idea what is expected of them."

"Young people, surrounded by radio, television, and the movies, are impatient with reading and writing. Now they have to see, too." This was the observation of Sister M. Johanna, F.S.M.J., who teaches the junior group of girls at St. Joseph's Commercial.

In two years, Sister Johanna has to prepare girls just up from grammar school to take positions in the business world. This means that the Notre Dame nun must not only teach religion and the practical subjects, shorthand, typing, book-

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### U. S. Sailors On Spain Visit

 Santiago De Compostela, Spain — (NC) — One hundred United States sailors, from four American war vessels paying a visit to Spain, offered their country's flag to the Apostle St. James the Greater at a ceremony at the historic sanctuary of Compostela. In doing so, they implored "that Our Lord may, through the Apostle, bestow his blessings" upon the U. S. and Spain.

THE SAILORS' pilgrimage was made under the leadership of Admiral Richard L. Conolly, in the U. S. Navy's first official visit to Generalissimo Francisco Franco's Spain. A Navy spokesman said the U. S. Navy was renewing relations with the Spanish Navy to add Spanish ports to add Spanish ports to its calling list.

ADMIRAL CONOLLY later conferred with Generalissimo Franco at La Coruna, accompanied by General Henderson, Maj. Robert W. Harper, Brig. Gen. William L. Ritchie of the Air Force and U. S. Naval Attaché Preston Mercer. The sailors of the whole squadron, meantime, were guests of Madrid.

At Compostela the offering of the flag at the sanctuary was read in English by the commander of one of the American ships, Captain Joyce, the highest Catholic officer of the group. Msgr. Lazo Clair, who replied in English, congratulated the U. S. sailors "for the example of spirituality which they have given to the whole world."

During the Mass, celebrated by the Lieutenant Vicar of the Maritime Province of El Ferrol, a choir of French pilgrims sang. At the end of the ceremony, the sailors gathered around the image of the Apostle James to venerate it and also kissed the ring of the Bishop, who gave to each a medal of the Saint.
