Dance Slated At St. Helen's

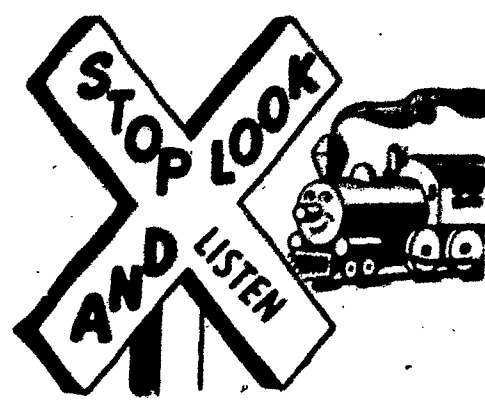
