

SVD Novitiate Admits 47 In Class At Conesus

Forty-seven clerical novices of the Eastern Province of the Society of the Divine Word are to be invested with the habit of the society, today (Thursday, Sept. 8) at St. Michael's Novitiate at Conesus.

The Very Rev. Robert C. Hunter, S.V.D., Provincial of the society will preside at the investiture. The ceremony, outstanding in the religious life of Rochester diocese, will start the young men on the spiritual training of their five-year novitiate.

In charge of the novitiate will be the novice-master, the Rev. Wilbert Wagner, S.V.D. Father Wagner comes from Pittsburgh, studied at Girard, Pa. and Techy, Illinois and was ordained at St. Gabriel's Seminary, Vienna, Austria. During the past year he prepared himself for his novitiate work in Rome.

THE NEW NOVIATES represent the graduates of the three proprietary seminaries in the Eastern province of the Society, St. Francis Xavier at Island Creek, Mass.; Sacred Heart at Roseton, N. J., and St. Joseph's at Roseton, N. J.

During the inauguration of building operations will begin on at St. Michael's, the ceremony will be private. Later on a blessing of the new novitiate is being planned.

The new novices were expected at Conesus, Sept. 8 when they were to immediately undertake a three-day retreat in preparation for their ceremony on the birthday of the Blessed Mother, Sept. 8.

Card. Gilroy Named Legate to India

Yakima City — (NC) — His Holiness Pope Pius XII has named His Eminence Norman Cardinal Gilroy, Archbishop of Cincinnati, to serve as Papal Legate at the Holy See in India, in January, 1950.

A Plenary Council is the council of the Archbishops and Bishops of a country or region under the presidency of a Legate of the Holy See. The Holy See determines the matter to be discussed and ratifies the council's decrees. A Plenary Council has no power to define doctrine. Its plenary legislative and disciplinary decrees bind the entire region or country, only a Bishop of the region having the power to dispense with them.
