Douglas Mitchell was best man and Harry Erway Jr. of Corning, Allan Mallette Jr., and Karl Stricker served as ushers.

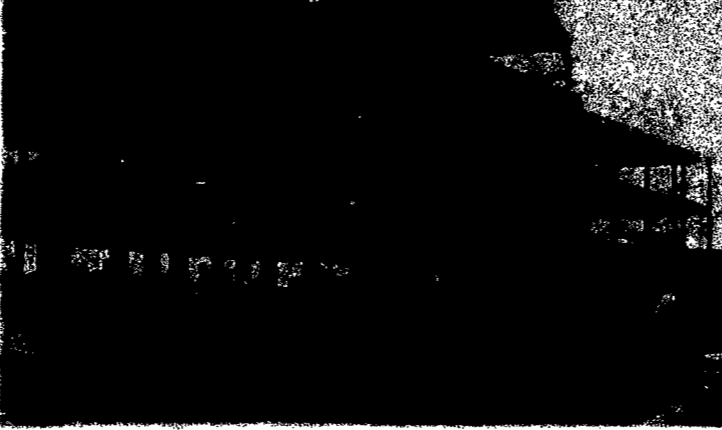
