Fr. O'Donnell Named Head Of First Red Cross Chapter

The Rev. John C. O'Donnell, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Danville, is the newly-elected chairman of Clara Barton Chapter No. 1 of the American Red Cross.

Father O'Donnell was elected at the quarterly meeting of the Board of Directors in Danville. The Chapter is named after Clara Barton, American philanthropist who founded the American Red Cross Society in Danville, May 21 1881, and was its first president.

AS CHAIRMAN of Chapter No. 1, Father O'Donnell succeeds Herbert M. Ellinwood, area director of the New York State Employment Service who has been transferred to Jamestown.

Father O'Donnell was elected to the Board of Directors of Chapter No. 1 in July and also to the Executive Committee. He has been pastor of St. Patrick's since April, 1945. He taught at Aquinas Institute from October 1928 until 1937 and spent 8 years more on the faculty of St. Andrew's Seminary.

During his twelve years of teaching he traveled weekends to East Bay and Sodas Point to assist in parish work.

A native of Auburn, Father O'Donnell was educated in Auburn High School, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries and holds degrees from St. Bernard's and St. Bonaventure College.

A group of five Maestre Pie Filippini (Religious Teachers Filippini) came to this country in 1910 and opened a school in the parish of St. Joachim at Trenton, N. J.

The American Province of this Order has its Mother House, Novitiate, Probationary Juniorate and Higher Community Preparatory schools at Villa Walsh, Morristown.

They teach in the Elementary and Secondary schools established by the Institute and engage in Missionary activities. Mother Ninetta Jonata M.P.F., Superior of the Order at Morristown, N. J. Sister Felicea Somma succeeds Sister Gabriel Biali who was Superior for eight years.

For the past thirteen years a group of Sisters from this Order have quietly and effectively rendered an outstanding service to the families of St. Mary's of the Lake church in conducting a program of Social and Catechetical work among the more than 300 families and children of the parish.

THEIR TEACHING of the fundamental truths of our holy religion and genuine interest in the social problems of the parish ioners not only requires their time in Watkins Glen but also in Montour Falls, Odessa and Burdette all situated within the vast confines of Schuyler County, wherein a small Catholic population is to be found.

A daily program of religious instructions for children from the first to the sixth grades is but a part of their many duties and in their effective way they have been a stalwart aid to the various pastors who have served in Watkins Glen.

Saint Lucia Filippini, Foundress of the Order was born in Corneo Tarquinia, Italy, January 13, 1672, and died in Montefiascone, March 25, 1732, and was canonized in 1881.
