\$84,000 Drive For Pittsford School Opens

A campaign for \$84,000 to remodel the recently acquired historic mansion on Main St., Pittsford into a school for St. Louis Parish pupils was launched this week under the direction of the Rev. Dr. Louis Edelman, pastor of St. Louis Church.

Giving the campaign enthusiastic impetus, the special gifts committee headed by Raymond R. Simmons, chairman reported substantial amounts at a meeting Friday night in the church hall.

Success of the drive will determine expansion plans for the parish, need for which is indicated by the fact that approximately 200 persons attend Sunday Mass each week. The establishment of a mission at Bushville Basin where Mass is celebrated each Sunday in the Immaculate Heart of Mary Chapel was an expansion necessity.

In his plans for the remodeling of the 150-year-old mansion, Father Edelman declared that he does not intend in any way to alter its beauty.

Children who attend the school will have a new building to call their own. Father Edelman believes that such a mission as is necessary to provide space for the school children will be limited to the simplest kind of work. Father Edelman stated:

Future development of the Main St. property includes plans for a church, school and rectory. Father Edelman has been pastor for 20 years during which time growth of the parish has been increasingly steady.

With a pressing need for a school, the parish acquired the historic mansion on Main St., formerly woodwork and furniture which were brought at great expense from Albany to meet the needs of the parish.

Last owners of the home, considered one of the outstanding examples of colonial architecture in the region, were Mr. and Mrs. George N. Lind. Prior to that the residence was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Theodore C. Briggs.

Mr. Briggs is chairman of the board of the Lawyers Cooperative Publishing Co.
Edwin Quinn is general chairman of the campaign. Walter N. Maxwell is campaign secretary.

A soldier, explorer, geographer, priest and friend of the fierce men of the Sahara, he lived quietly among them and gladly accepted death from their hands.
