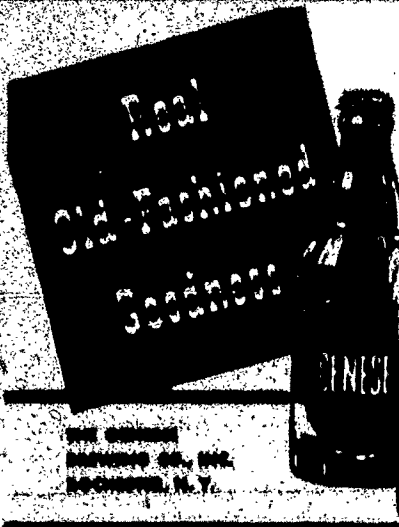

Jews Honor French Priest Who Saved Their Lives

Paris (RNS) - A simple marble tablet has been placed in the chapel of the monastery of the Fathers of Sainte Marie de Tinchebray, in the department of the Orne, by five grateful Jews who were protected there during the war.

On the tablet is engraved: "Within the shadow of this chapel, five Israelites were saved from death on June 22, 1944. Glory to God. Gratitude to the Very Rev. Father Leconte."

ON THE JUNE day mentioned, while the German lines and the battle was raging in the Normandy bridgehead nearby, a skeleton-thin man slipped into the monastery grounds under

cover of darkness and asked to see the superior.

"Father," he said, "we are five Jews escaped from Nazi concentration camps. . . . No need to go any further," replied Father Leconte without hesitation. "Fetch your comrades."

FATHER LECONTE hid the Jews, until the liberation of the region and meanwhile managed to get word to their families that they were alive and well. They were only a few of the many others, including Allied parachutists and Maquis, who were hidden in the monastery during the four years of the German occupation.

Father Leconte, who was a sick man at the time, died shortly after the five Jews left the monastery on August 7, 1944.

Catholic Printers Block Red Leaflets

Stuttgart (NC) - An echo of the recent Western German election:

The Catholic staff of a printing establishment at Winnenenden, near here, refused to print a huge order of communist campaign leaflets, after it had been accepted by the printing firm's management. Their ground was that, as Catholics, they would incur excommunication if they helped to promote communist interests. There was but two Protestants on the staff and they could not do it alone.

'Opus Dei,' Lay Religious Group, Launched in Chicago

Chicago (NC) - A young Spanish priest has just opened headquarters here for a Secular Institute, a branch of the Spanish Opus Dei (Work of God). The Branch here is an organization of professional laymen, who are banded together to carry on a life of spiritual perfection while working among the people.

Opus Dei is the first of these Secular Institutes to have been recognized by the Holy See and to have been put under papal jurisdiction as a third category in addition to the traditional Religious Orders and Congregations. In Spain, Opus Dei also has female organizations. The Secular Institutes are regarded as a "new form of religious life" to fit the modern apostolate.

THE SPANISH priest is the Rev. Joseph M. Muzquiz, of Madrid. He opened the Opus Dei headquarters at 5544 S. Woodlawn avenue near the University of Chicago campus, amid shady lawns and tall poplars, in a veritable garden of this metropolis.

There is nothing fancy about the old brick building a three-story residence which has a chapel for the use of the residents and members of Opus Dei.

Father Muzquiz ushered this writer into the home which had no chairs and was in need of painting. The kind priest smiled and said:

"WE'RE JUST getting set. We moved in a few days ago. But this place will be busy soon. We expect many members from among the newsmen, lawyers, students and other professional men. Our work appeals to those who wish to continue their work but also lead a saintly life."

He explained that the Opus Dei was the first Secular Institute to get full approval of the Holy See, and that it was welcomed here by His Eminence Samuel Cardinal Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago.

He emphasized that members of the Institute will not be required to live at the center, but will be required to lead a strong spiritual life of meditation, prayer, humility and carry on the apostolate of Christ.

THE OPUS DEI has centers in many countries of Europe and South America, as the work grows. Father Muzquiz said. More centers will be opened in other cities of the United States.

The general aim of Opus Dei, Father Muzquiz continued, is the sanctification of its members through the practice of the counsels of the Gospels.

THE MEMBERS who consecrate themselves to Opus Dei take temporary or perpetual vows are not public, but private, such as those as can be taken by any other Christian. He added:

"The members of the Institute prefer to pass unnoticed while performing their apostolic labors. They live cheerfully in their apostolic life. Their asceticism is a smiling asceticism. For that very reason the members must develop an attitude of cheerfulness."

New Mail Prices May Spare Catholic Press

Washington (NC) - Newspapers and magazines published by religious, educational, scientific, philanthropic, labor, agricultural or fraternal organizations would be exempted from the increases in second-class postal rates proposed in a bill approved by the Senate Committee on Post Office and Civil Service, a representative of the committee said.

The bill, which seeks to bring in about \$100,000,000 additional revenue for the Post Office Department, is calculated to raise about \$10,000,000 of this money through raised second-class rates, which affect newspapers and magazines.
