

Father Dobala To Mark 25 Years As Priest

Celebration of the silver anniversary of the Rev. Bruno Dobala, pastor of St. Theresa Church, will open Sunday, Oct. 9, with Solemn Mass at 10 a. m. Father Dobala will be assisted by the Rev. Norbert Zmeskal, O.F.M. Conv., of New Bedford, Mass., as a deacon; Rev. Ernest Majchrazk, O.F.M. Conv., of Shamokin, Pa., as subdeacon and Rev. Blase Szympaszko, O.F.M. Conv., of Auburn, as master of ceremonies.

The Assistant Priest at the Jubilee Mass will be the Very Rev. Justin Figas, O.F.M. Conv., director of the Holy Hour program in Buffalo, will preside at the service.

Father Dobala, who was born in Saffalo on March 15 1924, attended Corpus Christi School and Carlisle High School in Buffalo.

Completing his studies at St. Francis College in Syracuse, he entered the Franciscan Novitiate at St. Anthony on the Hudson. His philosophical and theological studies were had at Rome and Assisi.

Prince Cardinal Adam Sapieha ordained him to the holy priesthood at Cracow, Poland on June 22, 1924.

After his ordination, Father Dobala was assistant pastor at the Franciscan parishes of Chicago, Montreal, Rochester and Milwaukee. He assumed the pastorate of the Queen of the Holy Rosary in Buffalo from 1935 until 1942. His jubilee year marks his fourth year of pastorate at St. Theresa Church in Rochester.

A reception will be held for Father Dobala, Sunday, Oct. 9 at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. Members of the parish, various societies and friends from Rochester and Buffalo will greet the jubilarian at the parish hall.
