Auburn KC Party 5,000 To Receive Rosaries At Stadium 'Hour of Prayer'

Auburn — Anthony D. Carbonaro, program chairman, has announced that Auburn Council, Knights of Columbus, will hold the first in a series of "National Night" on Thursday evening, October 13. This first party will be a "Columbus Day" celebration, in honor of the saint.

Promotion of the growing devotion of Rosary recitation for world peace is the purpose of a Catholic layman who this week offered the Diocesan Holy Name Union 5,000 rosaries for distribution at "The Hour of Prayer" ceremony Friday night, Oct. 7, in Rochester's Red Wing stadium.

"The donor, who insists on remaining anonymous, expressed the hope that all who take the rosaries will do so with the intention to 'use them with some regularity.'"

He was inspired to the act, he said, by the story of Our Lady's apparitions at Fatima, Portugal and by the increasing growth of the Christopher Movement.

"During World War II," he declared, "we all were ready to do anything we could to end the bloodshed. Now, however, many of us have forgotten our determination. We should remember the message of the Blessed Mother at Fatima—to pray the Rosary for world peace. Constant devotion to the Rosary is the best means of avoiding World War III."

The rosaries being distributed are in black leather cases, in which also are printed cards noting the various mysteries assigned to each day of the week.

 The memory of ninety-eight sons of Aquinas Institute who died in World War II was solemnly honored last Sunday as His Excellency Bishop Kearney dedicated the new Aquinas Memorial Stadium in their name and prayed that "the generations who gather here may be worthy of the sacrifices these men made for them."

BELIGIOLA, CIVIC and military leaders shared the impressive ceremonies which preceded the opening football game of the 1949 Aquinas season.

The official opening of the new half-million dollar sports edifice was finished less than five minutes when the Little Irish scored their first touchdown against Bishop Byrne High School of Port Arthur, Texas. Then the untired Maroon under their new coach Mike Connelly, kept driving to convince a record throng that the heritage of Harry Wright's great 47 and 48 teams was not forgotten.

Mixing an aerial battle with solid ground advances, Aquinas published out a convincing 26-0 victory. A crowd of 22,650 flocked in the bright sunshine during pre-game ceremonies as the names of the school's war dead were slowly read by Lt. Col. Austin B. Hanna, former Army chaplain and Lt. Comdr. John Onorato, C.S.B., former Navy chaplain, now members of the Aquinas faculty.

TWO LARGE BRONZE plaques listing the dead students and the names of the leaders of the city wide stadium fund campaign held in 1945 were unveiled in midfield to climax the formal ceremonies opening the stadium for Aquinas athletic use. Mrs. Anna May Rush, representing Rochester's Gold Star Mothers placed a wreath on the plaques as Taps were sounded by buglers Arthur Meville and Anthony Infantolino.

This week the plaques have been permanently placed in the upper walls of the stadium's main entrance facing Mt. Read Boulevard.

Preceding Bishop Kearney's brief address of tribute, Mayor Samuel B. Dicker spoke for the city. In praising the Italian Fathers and friends of Aquinas for erecting so practical and lasting a memorial he thanked Aquinas authorities for providing Rochester with a beautiful stadium for public use.

Major General Edward Peck Curtis and the Rev. William J. Duggan, C.S.B., director of the stadium also spoke.

A PARADE from Aquinas Annex preceded the impressive stadium events. Directed by Brig. Gen. Alfred H. Doud of the 105th AAA Brigade, National Guard, the parade included groups of National Guardsmen, Naval Reservists, Marines and representatives of all veterans groups in the county. A massed color guard and several military bands added to the martial spirit of the scene.

Overhead spectators watched an impressive air show provided by flights of 17 F-4's from the Air National Guard and five Navy Gruman "Wildcats." In one formation over the stadium during the ceremonies the planes massed to form a giant "A" in the sky. Feature of the air maneuvers was the lightning passage of two Army Jet fighter planes who repeatedly streaked across the stadium at terrific speed.

Among those on the reviewing stand were members of the Aquinas Memorial Campaign Committee including the Rev. Hugh J. Haffey, C.S.B., now of Detroit who was instrumental in stimulating stadium plans and John D. Hayes and Elmer E. Fairchild, co-chairman of the drive which raised \$140,000.

New marble altar for the seminary chapel, arrived recently from Italy and will be set up this week in preparation for the dedication ceremonies. Two new marble statues also from Italy, have been erected on the grounds.

One statue of St. Francis has been set in place on a base near the entrance of the seminary. The other statue of the Blessed Virgin has been placed in the formal sunken garden, which fronts the lake, replacing one of Venus which formerly centered the Nestor garden.

HIGH SCHOOL age boys who will study for the order will not arrive until later in the Fall after the dedication ceremonies.

Another dwelling and four and a half acres of land were recently added to the seminary property in the purchase of the Herenden house. The sisters will act as house keeping and nursing staff for the seminary. There will be about 25 students there this year according to seminary authorities. More will arrive next year.

Four sisters of the order will arrive as soon as the new house is ready for them. The seminary has seven faculty members. Work of the order, besides the seminary includes retreats and missions given in Italian and English.

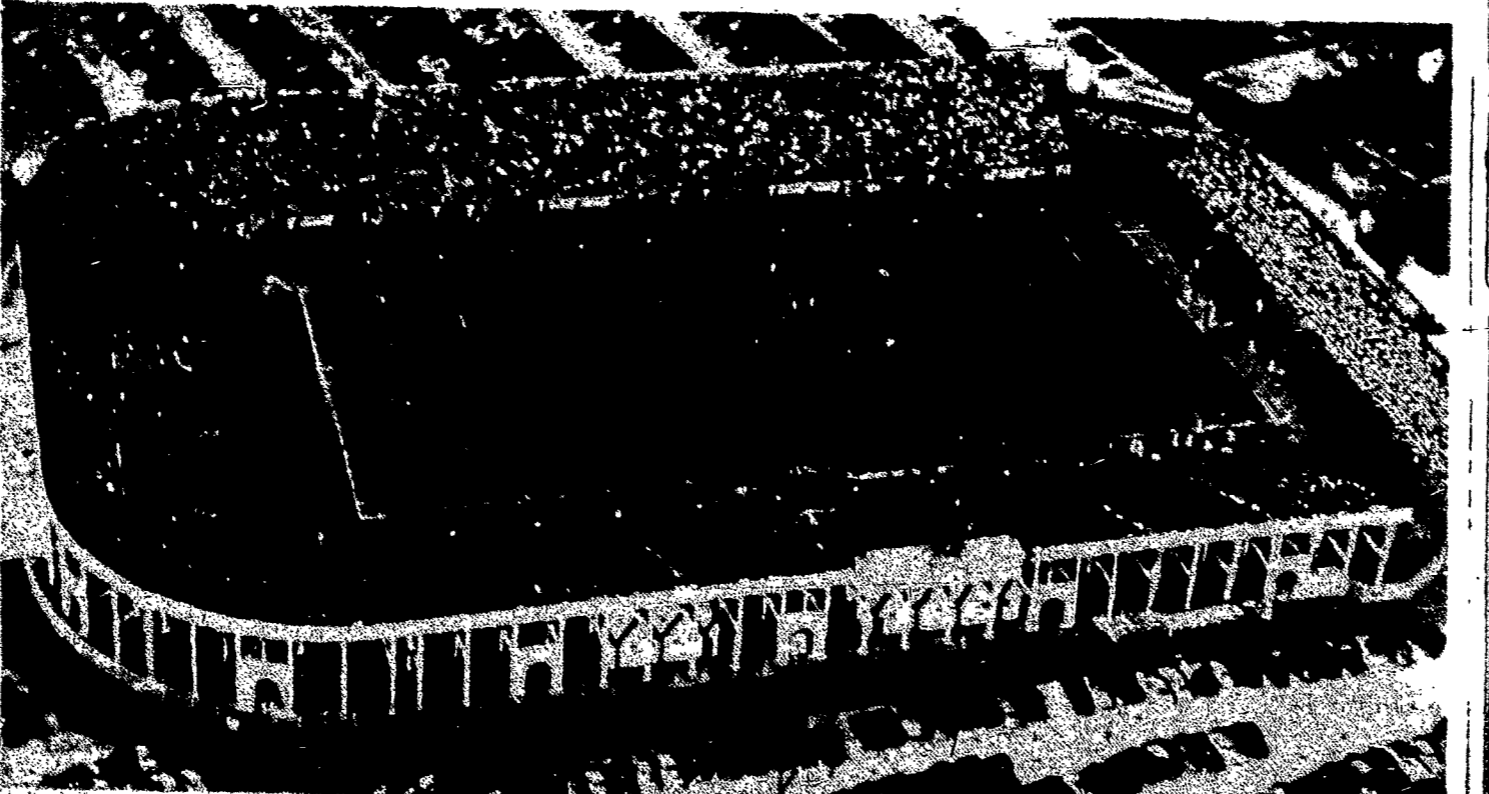
