St. Mary's Spurs Million Dollar Building Program

The second major phase of a vast renovation and rebuilding program in St. Mary's Parish, Elmira, will get under way this week when ground is broken for a new combination gymnasium and auditorium to be located at the corner of Franklin and Fulton Streets, according to the Rev. Thomas J. Toole, pastor.

The new structure will face on Franklin Street and measure 80 by 175 feet. When completed around the first of the year it will be a fully contained unit for all parish activities.

A completely modern gymnasium 121 by 80 feet with an auditorium seating capacity of 2,000, a stage 30 by 20 feet, directors room, kitchen facilities ample enough for dinners or large banquets will be found on the first floor.

The basement will have 12 bowling alleys, locker rooms and shower facilities.

THE BUILDING will be of cinder block construction faced with brick. A new heating plant of the latest design will be installed and will have sufficient capacity to take care of the demands to be made by the erection of a new school in the near future.

At this time a new addition is being built on the convent to accommodate a total of 21 Sisters, the increase in Sisters being necessary due to the all time high enrollment at the school.

The new wing to the convent is 70 by 34 feet and will include 3 sleeping rooms with running water and toilet facilities and a community room. This construction will be of brick to conform to the present building and will be completed by Christmas.
