

### Donald Attwater Slated For Culture Series Talk

Second lecture in the current Aquinas Christian Culture Series is scheduled for Friday, Nov. 11 at 8:15 P.M. in Aquinas Auditorium on Dewey Avenue with Donald Attwater, scholar, author, and writer speaking on "Culture with Worship."

Mr. Attwater's intimate knowledge of the history and traditions of the Eastern Church supplements the meagre state of information filtering through the cracks in the Iron Curtain. His treatment of his subject will stimulate a watchful appreciation of our religious and cultural heritage. His message is both appealing and instructive.

**WELL-KNOWN IN AMERICA.** Donald Attwater was born in England in 1892. He was reared in the socially-conscious English Protestant tradition and when he was nineteen, was received into the Catholic Church.

After attending law school for four years, he served as a soldier during the first World War in Italy, Palestine and Syria, where he made his first acquaintance with the Eastern Churches.

Mr. Attwater is the author of more than a dozen books including "Christians Churches of the East," "A Life of St. John Chrysostom," "A Dictionary of Saints," "A Dictionary of Popes," "Eastern Cath-

He is presently Associate Editor of "Orate Fratres" and contributing Editor to "The Commonweal." From 1922 to 1928 he edited "Pax," the Quarterly Review of the Benedictines of Calvey and was joint editor with Father Herbert Thurston, S.J. of Butler's "Lives of the Saints."

His translations of some of the works of the Russian philosopher, Berdyayev were the first to appear in the English language.

Mr. Attwater made an extensive lecture tour of the United States in 1937. During World War II he gave over a thousand lectures to the British and American armed forces. Subsequently, he taught at the new Dominican school in Wales from which he obtained a leave of absence in the summer of 1949 to give a course on Eastern Churches and their Liturgies at the University of Notre Dame.

# "LEHMAN WOULD AID PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS"

{ The Above, And Following Statements Made By Governor Lehman, APPEARED IN THE NEW YORK TIMES, October 16, 1949 }

## Governor LEHMAN Said:

- "I favor Federal Aid to education, which is sorely needed if we are to advance our standards of education".
- "I AM AGAINST THE BARDEN BILL. I am opposed to discrimination of any kind. The Barden Bill would obviously discriminate against certain groups of children in the furnishing of transportation, welfare and health services. As a matter of fact, I think it would seriously interfere, even in New York State, in the performance of services which the state has been carrying on for the benefit of all of its children for more than ten years".
