Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will be given at the end of the Holy Hour.

MEMORIALS OF Catholicism in Elmira, from the time that a first priest first rode on horseback into the Chenango Valley in 1787 through the establishment of Elmira's present eight parishes were traced in a historical sketch marking the jubilee.

The first St. Peter and Paul's Church was completed in 1848, and the present edifice constructed in 1854. The parish was the first to conduct a Catholic grammar school in the city, and founded the present high school.

Centenary ceremonies included solemn High Mass on Monday and Tuesday for all living priests and former parishioners and for the repose of the souls of all deceased parishioners.

Area Priests To Direct Drive For Relief Clothing

The national Thanksgiving Week drive to gather clothing and soap for needy families in Europe and the Far East will hit full stride in the Rochester Diocese on Nov. 20 under the personal leadership of its priests named as Deacons Direct on today by the Rev. John T. Callahan who will direct the campaign.

Authorized to promote the diocesan effort in their respective areas and to coordinate the parochial clothing and soap collection were Rochester—Rev. Edward A. Shannon; Auburn—Rev. Leo McManus; Corning—Rev. Daniel V. Hogan; Geneva—Rev. John B. Kilentz; Elmira—Rev. Joseph M. McNamara; Ithaca—Rev. John T. Walsh.

Emphasizing the urgency of this year's appeal the War Relief Services, NCCW this week revealed that 11 million expellees in Germany and Austria alone and untold refugees in the Near East and Far East face a "killing winter" because of lack of adequate clothing.

With the slogan "Thank God We Can Give" the national Catholic authorities have chosen Thanksgiving week for the amassing of as much usable clothing, wearable shoes and bars of soap as can be gathered so that shipments to overseas relief centers may beat the advent of winter storms.

Parishioners in the Rochester diocese will be directed to take their family contributions to their parish church or school hall during Thanksgiving Week. Volunteer workers will sort and package the clothing and ship it to packing centers in New York and San Francisco.

Distribution overseas, chiefly in Germany, Austria, Italy, China and the Near East will be made by Catholic relief workers to all people in need regardless of race, creed or color, the diocesan director promises.

K. C. Scholarship Test Deadline Moved To Dec. 1

Date for filing applications for the New York State Council, Knights of Columbus Scholarship examination in 1950 has been moved up to Dec. 1, 1949 according to George T. White, Uta chairman.

The New York State Council, Knights of Columbus offers eight scholarships throughout the state in the area one boy and one girl may win one each of the scholarships.

The scholarship award is now \$400 per year for four years. The sum awarded may be applied in whole or in part to defray the expenses of the holder for tuition, books, and maintenance in any college located in the United States conducted under Catholic auspices and with a scholastic standing equivalent of the colleges endorsed by the Regents of the University of the State of New York to confer degrees.

A GENERAL examination open to all eligible applicants will be held Jan. 7, 1950 according to District Deputy John J. Kinney.

Rochester Council's examination will be held in the Catholic Civic Center, Grand Knight Raymond L. Nais states. Dr. Raymond M. Nais, Uta, Uta Action Division Rochester Catholic Charities will be the sponsor assisted by District Deputy John J. Kinney.

A final examination will be held on March 11, 1950 for the three high Juniors in each Scholastic Division. Examinations will be prepared and graded by Educational Testing Service, a professional organization of high standing.

Any practicing Catholic boy or girl may make application for the examination.

The application must bear the signature of the candidate, that of his or her parent or guardian and that of the pastor or assistant pastor of the applicant.

Also included with the application must be the certification of some person in authority in the candidate's present school that the candidate for graduation in that school in January 1950 or June 1950.

Full information on the scholarships is contained in the application book. Books are available from Knights of Columbus councils in the area.
