Trappist's Book Is Reviewed For St. Stephen Unit

Geneva—Reviewing "The Waters of Silence" Thomas Merion's latest book before the St. Stephen's Rosary Society on Nov. 7 in Woman's building, Miss Regina Sweeney said the book was written for a two-fold purpose.

It was written to show the origin and development of the Cistercian order, popularly known as the Trappist order, and to explain the philosophy which underlies the lives of the monks she said.

"Although the silence, vigils, fasting and prayer make their lives very austere they choose asceticism because they have felt the insufficiency of a life devoted only to material pursuits. They believe that perfect love of God implies perfect sacrifice," she said.

"Having none of the pleasures of this world, they have all the happiness that the world is unable to give," she said.

THE ROSARY was recited for all deceased members of the society on the Feast of All Souls. A set of red vestments has been donated to St. Stephen's Church as this year's gift of the Rosary Society. It was announced.

Chinese To Share In Drive For Clothing Set In Diocese

Rev. John H. McGoey, assistant secretary of the China Welfare Committee reports that it was quite a thrill to see American Catholic churches preparing for the Clothing and Soap Collection scheduled for this Thanksgiving.

"The people there are suffering as they have never suffered before. They look without any hope whatsoever to the Red handiwork. If one day we hope to assist in a general victory over Communism it will be through an understanding assistance to the people who now look to us as their only hope."

Father McGoey, visiting from Shanghai has been helping direct a vast program of relief being carried on under the auspices of the organization in China during the past several years.

THE CLOTHING and soap drive is a nationwide Thanksgiving Week appeal in all Catholic parishes for usable clothing, shoes and bar soap for the needy and homeless in Europe, the Near and Far East.

Parishes in the Rochester Diocese will gather usable clothing, shoes and soap during the week of Nov. 28-31.

The Rev. John T. Callahan, appointed by His Excellency Bishop Kearney to head the diocesan campaign announced today that family contributions should be taken to parish churches or parochial school halls early in Thanksgiving Week. Volunteer parish workers will sort and ship the clothing to packing centers in New York and San Francisco where it will be freighted to Catholic relief centers in Germany, Austria, Italy, the Near East and Far East.

The slogan "Thank God We Can Give" has been chosen as the theme of the diocesan campaign—the first in three years—and every effort will be made to expedite shipment of diocesan contributions to overseas areas before the advent of winter storms, the priest said.

The Chinese question has been one that has brought much disillusionment. Father McGoey noted, to the people in America who have tried so hard in years past to help the poor and starving masses of China.

"CHINA HAS seemed to some," said Father McGoey, "just a marsh full of sinking sand, to absorb as nothing any unlimited amount of relief. With the coming of the new landlords in China there is a tendency to say hands off any further charity towards that stricken country. This would be a most tragic mistake."

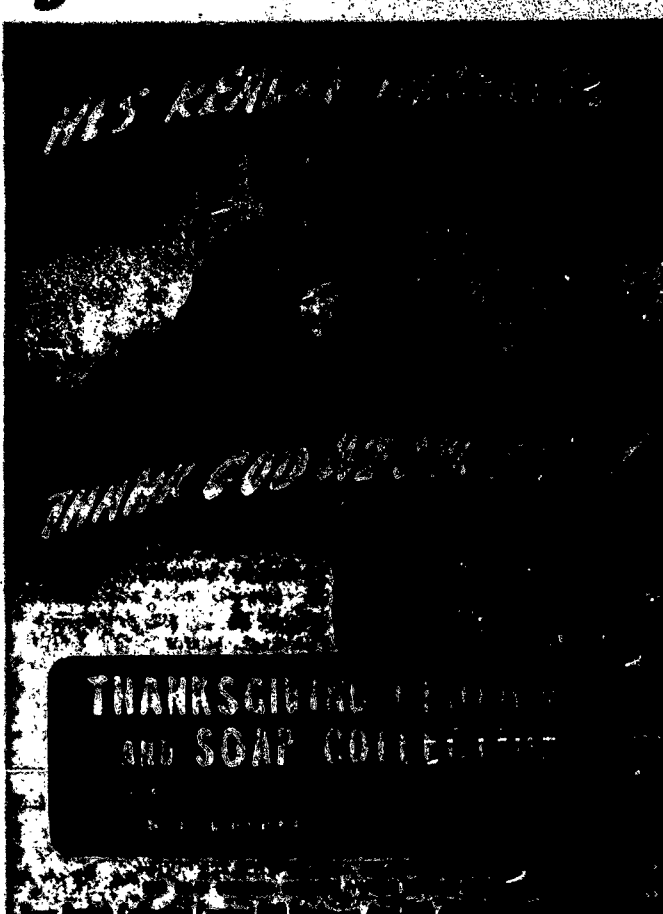
Father McGoey continued, "Where assistance is administered through the private agencies such as the Catholic Welfare Committee, 100 percent actually goes to the really needy. American Catholics thank God for the privileges and benefits enjoyed in our country, by sharing them with people who have known few days of plenty and relatively little benefit from their own country."

Fr. McMannus Heads Clothing Campaign

Auburn—The National Thanksgiving Week drive to gather clothing and soap for needy families in Europe and the Far East will hit full stride in the Rochester diocese on Nov. 20 under the personal leadership of six priests named as deanery directors today by Rev. John T. Callahan, who will direct the campaign.

Rev. E. Leo McManus, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church, has been appointed to supervise the drive in the Auburn churches. The slogan for the drive is "Thank God We Can Give."

Father McManus stated that he will seek large quantities of usable clothing, shoes and bars of soap for shipment to overseas relief centers.



A reminder of the Thanksgiving Clothing and Soap Collection, which will be conducted throughout the diocese during the week of November 28 to 31, is the official poster distributed to Catholic Churches and parishes. The drive is sponsored by War Relief Services, National Catholic Welfare Conference, which serve the war victims of 51 countries, regardless of race, creed or color.

THIS YEAR, the Auburn Knights also plan to offer from time to time on their program reflections or meditations of the type recommended by the Rev. James Keller M.M., founder of the Christopher Movement. These meditations are used as a form of prayer by people in all walks of life and of all religious beliefs.

Father Keller is the author of the best sellers "You Can Change the World" and "Three Minutes a Day."

Last Sunday's broadcast featured an explanation of the Story of Fatima and the apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary at the well known shrine in Portugal. The message of Mary to the three children was discussed, as well as their importance to the world in general and to Russia in particular.
