Final Tribute Paid Seneca Falls Parishioner, 91

Seneca Falls — The death of the oldest active member of St. Patrick's Parish occurred on Oct. 26, 1949, when Mrs. Agnes Durkin Halpin died, after a brief illness. Mrs. Halpin was the last survivor of the family of the late Nicholas and Elizabeth Hamill Durkin, early residents of Seneca Falls.

Born Nov. 9, 1858, her life span covered a period of 91 years. After graduating from the old Seneca Falls Academy in 1876, she taught for the following 17 years in the Seneca Falls Public Schools. Mrs. Halpin's clear memory and her varied interests made her long, active life interesting to her family and friends.

IN HER EARLY adult life, Mrs. Halpin acted as sacristan, selecting the flowers for decoration of the altar of St. Patrick's Church and doing the various tasks about the altar now cared for by the Sisters.

A widow of the late John A. Halpin, she is survived by her daughter, Miss Elizabeth M. Halpin of Haverstraw, N. Y., and her son, Joseph W. Halpin of Seneca Falls.

Funeral services were conducted at 8:30 a.m. Friday, Oct. 28, in her home and at 9 a.m. in St. Patrick's Church, with burial in St. Columbkille Cemetery.

Sister Mary Denis who left here three years ago taught for sometime and last September Sister M. Philomena left Seneca Falls to go to Selma after teaching in St. Patrick's for three years.

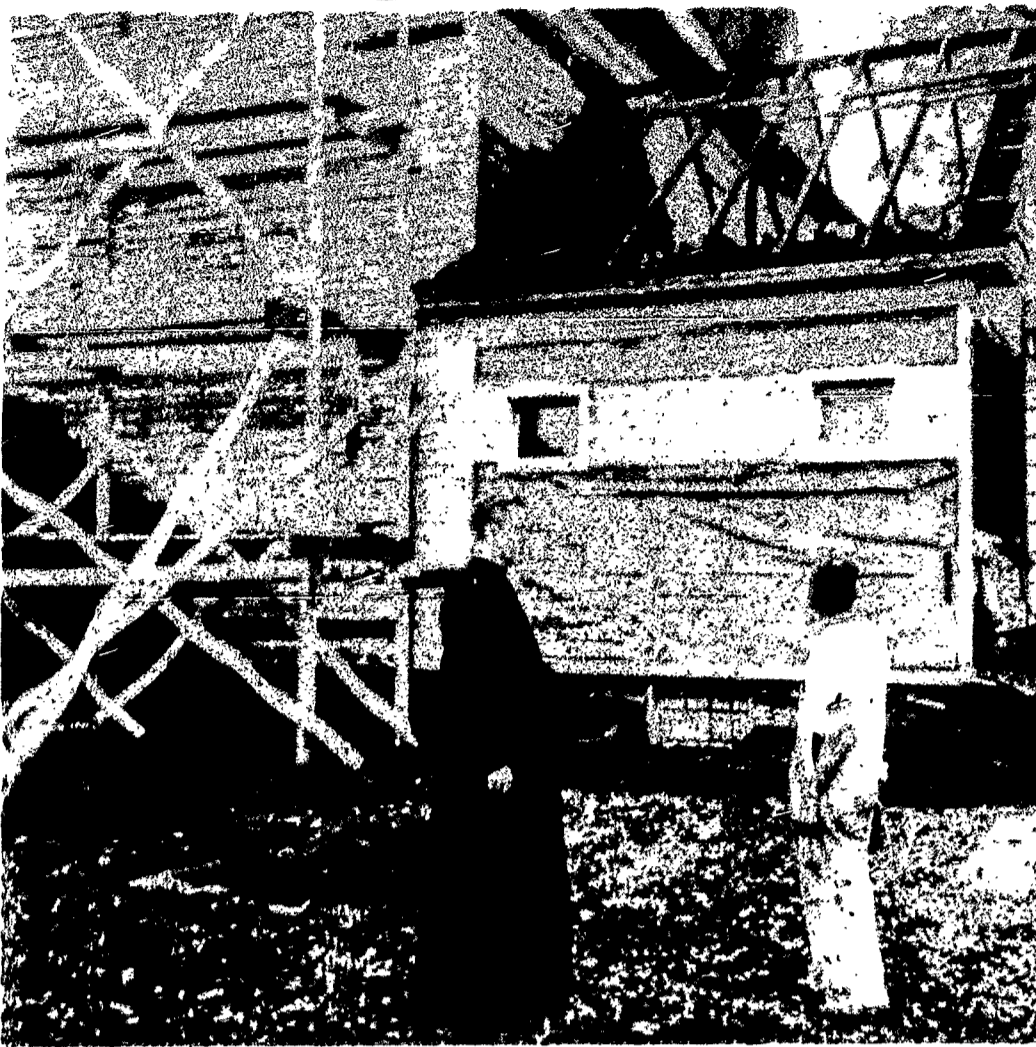

Church Ruined By K. of C. Present Check Fire Rises Again For Dominican Monastery In Trumansburg

Steady progress in restoring the gutted roof and walls and flooring of St. James the Apostle Church in Trumansburg was reported this week by the Rev. Leonard A. Kelly, pastor. His parish staff of workmen announced that the building will be closed in shortly to allow interior work during the winter.

The old church, destroyed by fire in January, is being reconstructed by local workmen under the contracting direction of Father Kelly and parishioners' funds. For the project, a parish subscription drive and contributions by parishes where Father Kelly was assigned to make a pulpito appeal.

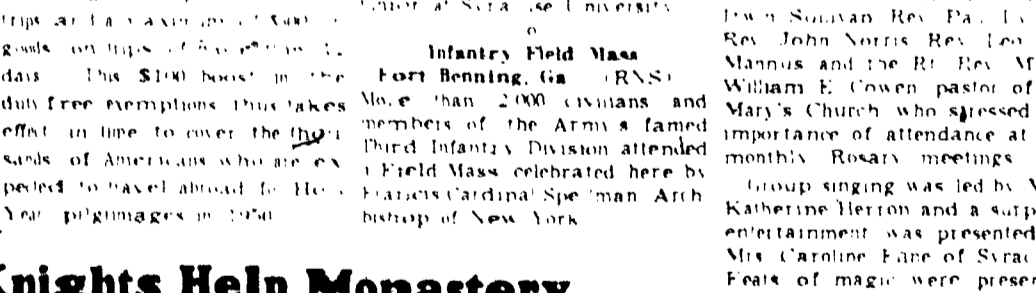
THIS WEEK the basic structure of the church was completed and complete new flooring installed. The old steeple, a massive landmark in the village, has been removed as work on the next project continues.

Next main step, Father Kelly said, will be the knocking out of the church wall behind the altar to provide a 20 foot extension for the sanctuary and sacristy.

The lights were symbols of that perpetual light in which Catholic faith teaches the souls of the just dwell for all eternity. Prayers for the dead led by the Rev. Benedict Ehmman pastor of St. Mary's were recited during the prayers a procession of altar boys escorted the Rev.
