\$9,052 Total Reported In Monastery Campaign

Fr. Shamon Calls Ithaca Women To Unified Action

Ithaca — Speaking in Parish Hall, Church of the Immaculate Conception, Ithaca, last Thursday evening before an audience of nearly 100 members of Ithaca district, National Council of Catholic Women, the Rev. Albert Shamon of Rochester, diocesan director of the Council, urged listeners to be "total and extraordinary Catholics." The speaker advocated using all their strength in united action by "sparkling the Council", each member becoming "a tool for the spread of the Faith."

Father Shamon told members that one of the reasons for the spread of paganism in the modern world is that "present day Catholics aren't Catholic enough or united enough," and that the Council, with its union of Catholic women throughout the United States affords the greatest and best opportunity for Catholic lay action.

FATHER SHAMON exhibited charts and explained the structure of the national Council. The speaker was introduced by the Rev. John T. Walsh, moderator of the Ithaca district.

Announcement was made by Father Walsh of a nationwide drive by Catholics for European war relief to be conducted during the week of Nov. 20. The drive is to collect clothing, shoes and soap only, and the donations are to be brought to Parish Hall as early in the week as possible.

Mrs. Arthur A. Cross, president, conducted the business meeting preceding Father Shamon's talk. Reports were received from the following committee chairmen: Mrs. H. M. Bishops from all upstate dioceses are on the fund drive committee. The Very Rev. Samuel Lator, O.F.M., president of St. Bonaventure College, Olean, is chairman of the campaign in the southwestern part of the state. Currently a national campaign for \$10,000,000 is underway.

Father Peyton To Talk Monday In Elmira On Rosary Crusades

The humble religious order priest who has made people of two nations Family Prayer and Family Rosary conscious will speak in Elmira at a dinner in Mark Twain Hotel, Monday evening, Nov. 20 at 7 p.m.

He is the Rev. Patrick Peyton, C.S.C., who will bring the story of his success in promoting motion pictures, national radio broadcasts and massed outdoor rallies in the interest of saving the Rosary, individually and in family and neighborhood groups.

Fr. Rev. Magr. William J. Brien, V.F., Dean of the Elmira diocese will be a guest of honor at the dinner.

Toastmaster will be John Timothy Smith, prominent Syracuse attorney and close friend of Father Peyton who will be the only speaker.

Tickets may be obtained at the cashier's office, Mark Twain Hotel. A capacity crowd including several priests from the Elmira area is expected.

FATHER PEYTON is a member of the Congregation of the Holy Cross, the same community of priests conducting Notre Dame University. His latest project is the motion picture, "The Road to Peace," starring Bing Crosby and Ann Ruyth.

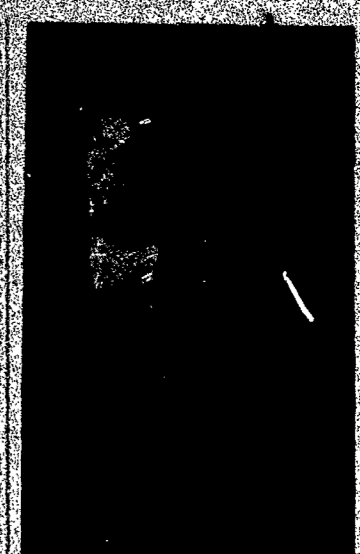
In August of this year Father Peyton directed a gigantic Crusade comprising 18 archdioceses of North West Canada and Alaska. Before this Crusade was completed another Crusade was begun in the diocese of Scranton, Pa., home of the Family Rosary Apostles.

Scranton is the first diocese in the United States to employ the Family Rosary Crusade plan developed by Father Peyton.

The rosary priest successfully conducted a Crusade in London, Ont. in which 6,000 Family Rosary salesmen secured pledges of more than 50 percent of the diocese of daily Family Rosary. Similar success was met in the Province of Saskatchewan.

Born in County Mayo, Ireland, Father Peyton came to this country at the age of 18. After working as sexton of St. Peter's Cathedral in Scranton, Pa., he entered Holy Cross Seminary at Notre Dame, Ind.

A FEW YEARS before ordination he contracted tuberculosis, but through his great love and faith in Our Lady, his health was restored. After his ordination in June 1917, he made the resolution to restore the Family Rosary to ten million homes in America.
