

Bishop Bohachevsky To Offer Anniversary Mass

The unity and vigor of Ukrainian Catholic life in Rochester will be solemnly saluted at St. Joseph's Church on Sunday, Nov. 27, when His Excellency Bishop Constantine Bohachevsky, the Apostolic Exarch of the Ukrainian Catholic Diocese of America celebrates a High Mass of Thanksgiving at 10 o'clock to mark the fortieth anniversary of the founding of the Madison Avenue parish.

Bishop Bohachevsky will celebrate the anniversary at 10 o'clock in the church hall. The Rev. John Zuk and Rev. Alexander Spetanku of Buffalo will assist the bishop at the Mass according to plans announced by the Rev. Stephen Holowicki pastor and the Rev. Dr. Albo Rudnitsky assistant.

BISHOP BOHACHEVSKY, born in Western Ukraine in 1884 and educated for the priesthood at the University of Innsbruck, Austria, was ordained in January, 1909. He received his Doctorate in theology and for eight years was professor at the Ukrainian Seminary of Lviv.

Successively named Rector of the Lviv Cathedral and Vicar General of the diocese, he was consecrated Bishop in 1924 and assigned to the Ukrainian Diocese of America. His silver jubilee of consecration was celebrated the past summer at Stamford Conn. where Ukrainians from all parts of the United States and Canada gathered to honor their leader.

5 Per Cent Rise Brings School Total To 33,431

Nearly five per cent increase in registration in the 102 Rochester Diocesan Catholic schools is noted in the official census released this week by the Rev. Charles J. Mahoney, superintendent of Catholic schools. A total of 33,431 pupils and students is listed for the 81 elementary schools, 15 secondary schools and six higher education institutions of the diocese.

A breakdown of these figures shows 27,518 pupils in the elementary schools, 4,885 in the high schools and 1,028 in higher education. Fifty-one kindergartens in the diocese show a total of 2,962 youngsters registered. All elementary and high schools have an enrollment of 32,403 of the total 22,928 are credited to the Rochester and suburban Brighton, Gates, Greece and Irondequoit area.

LARGEST SINGLE education institution with a registration of 1,702 next in size among secondary schools is Nazareth Academy with 1,117 and Our Lady of Mercy High School 867.

Three Rochester elementary schools lead registration in that group. They are St. Monica's with 954 pupils, Holy Rosary, 891 and Sacred Heart 850.

Higher education totals show Nazareth College with 4428, St. Bernard's Seminary, 199 and St. Andrew's Seminary (upper classes) 96. Registration in schools of nursing is listed as St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester 139, St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira 120 and St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell, 46.

In a statement issued previously, Dr. Mahoney pointed out that taxpayers of the twelve-county Rochester Diocese are being saved more than \$6,000,000 yearly by the self-supporting operation of Catholic educational institutions.

Close to 650 boys and girls of Rochester diocese enjoyed their stay at Camp Stella Maris during the past season recorded as one of the most successful. The Rev. Paul Morgan of St. Bernard's Seminary headed the boys' staff while Miss Mary Hannick of Geneva Settlement House was head counselor for the girls.

Father Mulcahy of Rochester Catholic Charities serves as Camp Director.

COST OF REMODELING the buildings purchased by the Society of the Atonement, Oct. 27, 1948 is estimated at \$250,000. A chapel, gymnasium and classrooms are included in the transformation.

St. John's will not open for school until the second semester, Wednesday, Jan. 4, 1950. A total of 50 students from next year high school to second year college will come to Montour Falls from the Franciscan Seminary at Graymoor, Garrison, N. Y., and 21 faculty members for the opening of school.

The Cook Academy buildings, were erected in 1880 and in 1888 by the late Charles Cook, builder of the Champlain Canal. The Friars of the Atonement bought the property for \$64,000. Since the purchase the major work of renovation has been in

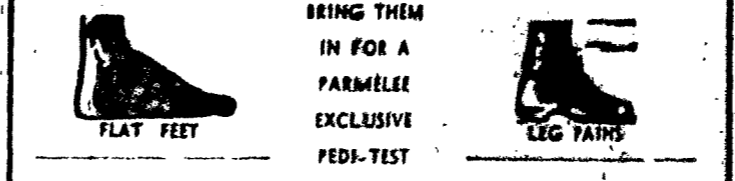
