Scientist Avers Prayer Essential To Soul-Saving

"Nothing in life, not even life itself, is as important as the saving of a single soul, especially one's own." Dr. Benedict V. Favata of Strong Memorial Hospital staff told members of the Catholic Women's Club Monday evening.

Titling his discussion "A Scientist Looks At Prayer" the boyishly-looking brain surgeon gave an analysis of the elements of prayer.

Prayer is a controversial subject among scientists, said Doctor Favata. They wonder what makes a scientist think of prayer and what its origin is.

"Darwin once thought his theory of evolution had blasted religion for all time," Doctor Favata declared. "Since then there have been five theories and remember they are all just theories."

DESCRIBING THE Bible as a "most scientific book," the speaker pointed out the scientific soundness of the Bible story of the origin of life. "The difficulty of the Bible is that people usually forget it whole without getting down to its real meaning."

He emphasized the fact that there is no reason why the scientific mind shouldn't accept the Bible's version of the creation of the world. "The hitch in all evolution theories comes where the atheistic scientist says everything started in the water, but doesn't say where the water came from."

What shape a man's body evolved from doesn't matter any way, the speaker said. "Every thing in the world is perfect, scientifically, chemically perfect, but human beings in the world are far from perfect because of the element of evil, which is the rejection of God."

It is the great endowment of God, the human will, which enables man to reject God and accept His negation, evil. Dr. Favata asserted, "Nobody just falls into Hell;" he stressed, "If one goes to Hell slowly and purposefully because he wants to be there, it's a proof of the mercy of God that

Housing Plan Fight Urged By CWV Leader

Review of their fight for low-cost rental housing for large family groups will be under taken by more than 20,000 members of the Catholic War Veterans of New York State following recent election approval of the State's public housing program.

That decision was made Sunday night by Thomas J. Cuote of Brooklyn State department CWV commander at ceremonies in Holy Rosary Hall marking mass installation of 11 letters of ten local CWV posts.

Better housing Cuote pointed out, is in line with the Catholic belief that the family and its security are the foundation of American institutions.

The CWV, according to Cuote, also will continue to press its campaign against the relaxation of the divorce laws of New York or other states. "In my opinion," said Cuote, "divorce restrictions in this State are too loose as they stand."

Catholic War Veterans will oppose the giving of United States funds and military aid to Yugoslavia, Cuote asserted, until that state fulfills three conditions. They are

(1) Release from imprisonment of Archbishop Stepinac and other clergymen of all faiths who have been arrested and jailed by the Yugoslav regime; (2) cooperation with the United States government; (3) promotion of world peace.

It was Cuote's first official visit to Rochester. He reported that CWV membership in the state has increased 15 percent during the last year and predicted a 25,000 increase soon.

The Rev. Raymond C. Heissel, assistant pastor of Blessed Sacrament Church, was named chaplain of Troop 21.

Scout officials took part in the ceremony. They were Milton H. Punnett, pioneer district commissioner; William J. Maxton, district chairman; George Dennis, district scout executive; Ralph Sawyer and Otto Haage, assistant district commissioners.

William J. Doell, committee chairman, was in charge of the program, which included a film on scouting.
