

Modern Revolutionists Can Be Overcome By Modern Saints, Avers Msgr. Sheen

A plan for conquering revolutionists and restoring peace was advanced by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen of Catholic University, who spoke Friday evening to an Aquinas Christian Culture Lecture audience and was a guest on the Courier Journal's Sunday radio program.

The distinguished author orator diagnosed the ailment of revolutionists as "interior civil war" and "interior civil war" and prescribed a dose of love administered by modern-day saints.

"Revolutionists don't know it, but they are looking for love," Monsignor Sheen said at Aquinas. "The modern world needs saints who can love them." He said revolutionists are "people who are mad at the world because they are angry that nobody loves them."

"EACH OF US is the seat of a civil war because there is a discrepancy between what we are and what we should be, asserted the writer of best selling Peace at Soul. "The wrong solution to this interior conflict of body and soul makes revolutionists; the right one makes saints."

Declaring that those who have

had the Faith and lost it "have the conflict profoundly," Monsignor Sheen said they are afflicted by "nostalgia" because they were "once in union with the very best." Correcting a misconception which people hold, the orator pointed out that "nobody ever left the Faith for a reason. They always lose the Faith over a thing, a commandment not a creed."

He cited three causes for loss of Faith: (1) Pride or egotism ("Pride affects sophomores, those who have come to know a little more than others, but not enough"), (2) worldliness or avarice ("too much concern over material things") and (3) lust.

Covering three approaches to the problem of conflict between body and soul, he compared the philosophies revealed in the confessions of St. Augustine, Hicelise and Abelard, and Jean Jacques Rousseau. "St. Augustine resolved the problem by making body subject to soul, and the whole personality subject to God. Hicelise and Abelard, who sinned through illicit love, compromised by admitting they did wrong, but used the excuse of weakness. Rousseau's philoso-

phy denied the soul, said that man was only an animal, that love naturally good, and that civilization makes him evil.

"Rousseau's philosophy, from which Freud developed his idea has brought untold misery and frustration upon the world," Monsignor Sheen said. Thinking like this, he added, has brought forth the crop of revolutionists who are presently in ascendency.

SAINTS CAN conquer the revolutionists by loving everybody because he has a soul and seeing every person as a potential or actual child of God, no matter what his bad points, he said. "What poor, frustrated people want is love," the speaker emphasized, revealing that he received hundreds of letters from unhappy, unloved individuals.

In his radio interview by the Rev. Richard Tormey, Courier Journal associate editor, Monsignor Sheen commented on his book, Peace of Soul, and described his trip to Europe and Fatima.

Discussing the book he said its success was "a happy meeting of a great social need." "Millions of people are searching for a security of mind they cannot find in the world." Moderns are so "exteriorized" they are confused and lost. Shown that true peace is within and that peace of soul brings real happiness, they have found in this book a guide to better living.

The noted prelate said he was impressed by the severity of Fatima. "It is a place of penance. It is hard to get to, its accommodations are hard on pilgrims. Its whole atmosphere repeats the theme of penance and sacrifice which the Blessed Mother emphasized when she appeared to the three children there in 1917."

Student Center Dedicated On Niagara Founders Day

NIAGARA FALLS—An all-day celebration on Sunday marked the observance of Founders Day on the Niagara University campus. In addition to the commemorative exercises held each year in observance of the founding of the university in 1866, the new student center and auditorium was dedicated.

The auditorium is the largest of its kind in the Niagara Falls area. When used for academic functions it will seat approximately 2,500 persons and when being used for basketball will accommodate more than 3,000.

THE DAY'S PROGRAM began with the celebration of a Solemn High Mass in the university chapel by the Very Rev. Francis L. Meade, C.M., LL.D., president of the university. The Very Rev. Francis X. Desmond, C.M., S.T.D., rector of Our Lady of Angels' Seminary was dean of the Mass and the Rev. Edward J. Kiernan, C.M., Ph.D., vice president of the university served as deacon. The Rev. John H. Murray, C.M., M.A., instructor in the department of philosophy delivered the sermon.

The afternoon's dedication ceremonies were presided over by His Excellency, the Most Rev. John F. O'Hara, C.S.C., D.D., Bishop of the Buffalo Diocese. The Bishop laid the cornerstone and after blessing the new building he was the celebrant of Solemn Benediction, assisted by the Very Rev. Juvenal Lalor, O.P.M. president of St. Bonaventure College, deacon, and the Very Rev. Raymond Schouler, S.J. president of Canisius College sub-deacon.

IN THE DEDICATION sermon the Very Rev. Daniel M. Leahy, C.M., J.C.D., LL.D. Provincial of the Eastern Province of the Vincentian Fathers, cited that Catholics in supporting their own schools sacrifice much due to the double burden of taxation which is placed upon them.

"Catholics contribute hundreds of millions of dollars annually toward the upkeep of their own schools," Father Leahy said, "and at the same time carry their share of the taxes for the upkeep of public schools."

"Yet," he continued, "as people carry the burden in a spirit of faith and they will continue to carry it in that spirit, if it must be."

It is in this spirit of Faith that Niagara has been built. From a material standpoint she has taken upon herself a heavy burden. She views this burden in the light of the spiritual of her obligation to educate the whole man to develop his soul and body in the harmonious manner which is Catholic education.

In closing Father Leahy referred to the Providence of God, through which thousands of men and women have dedicated themselves under religious vows to the cause of Catholic education. "They, through their time and talents, their strength and in a word, their lives, with the loyal support of the faithful, are a living endowment, without which Catholic education could not continue."

Founded in 1866 by the Rev. John J. Lynch, C.M. later first Bishop of Toronto, Niagara University was first located in the city of Buffalo. This site, however, did not prove satisfactory and during the Christmas vacation of 1866, negotiations were begun for the purchase of a more desirable site. Father Lynch and his assistant, Father John Monahan, C.M., finally arranged for the purchase of a farm on Portage Road. The entire tract consisted of 100 acres. During the same year, 200 adjoining acres were added and work on the new institution proceeded immediately. It was not until May of 1877 that the College of Our Lady of Angels, afterward to develop into Niagara University, was opened.

When Niagara first opened its doors, the campus consisted of but a single dwelling in a few acres of wilderness. The faculty consisted of but two priests and

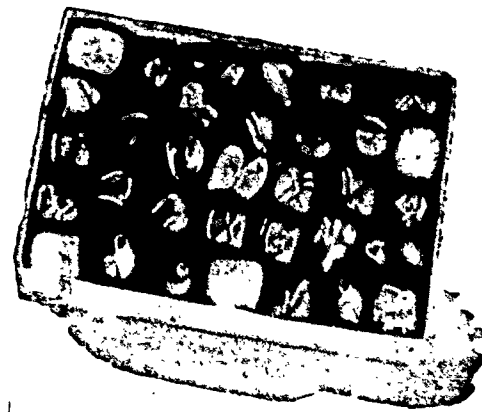
