Christophers Offer \$30,000 In New Book, Play Contest

New York — (NC) — The opening of a second Christopher Award Contest, \$30,000 for the best book, motion picture and stage play has been announced by the Rev. James Keller, M. M. nationally known author and founder of the Christopher movement. The aim of the contest is to provide better quality books, motion pictures and plays for the tens of millions who are reached through these important media.

As in the first contest cash prizes will be awarded to the best book manuscript and play script. The new contest will also offer a cash award on the writers of the best-written motion picture appearing on the screen during the year 1950.

THE CONTEST begins on November 21, 1949 and closes on November 1, 1950. It is open to all residents of the United States and Canada of whatever race or religion provided their entries are "in accord with Christian principles and not against them."

Because of the great number of entries anticipated, there were 2,000 in the first contest, a necessary requirement is that all book manuscripts must be entered through a publisher or literary agent, and play scripts through a producer or dramatic agent. They will be "screened" them and sent down to New York headquarters of the Christophers.

Judges for the contest will be announced in the near future said Father Keller. The prizes are as follows: \$15,000 for the winning book, \$10,000 for the best motion picture and \$5,000 for the best play script.

THE TOP LITERARY award of \$15,000 in the first contest went to an Episcopalian George L. Howe for his first novel "Call It Treason" which was published recently by Viking Press and has since become a best seller. "Mother Hildebrand" by Rose-

The following explanation was given for the action: "Revisions made in this film are deemed sufficient to remove the substantial manner, the original objection of the Legion of Decency, 'Beyond the Forest', however, still contains suggestive costuming and situations."
