

Bishop Bohachevsky To Offer Anniversary Mass

The unity and vigor of Ukrainian Catholic life in Rochester will be solemnly related at St. Joseph's Church on Sunday, Nov. 27, when His Excellency Bishop Constantine Bohachevsky, the Apostolic Exarch of the Ukrainian Catholic Diocese of America, celebrates a High Mass of thanksgiving at 10 o'clock to mark the fortieth anniversary of the founding of the Hudson Avenue parish.

Bishop Bohachevsky will preach the jubilee sermon at the Mass, to be celebrated in the Byzantine-Slavonic rite, and will be greeted with a banquet for all the parishioners at 5 p.m. in the church hall.

The Rev. John Zuk and Rev. Alexander Speranza of Buffalo will assist the Bishop at the Mass, according to plans announced by the Rev. Stephen Holowid, pastor, and the Rev. Dr. Aldo Rudnytsky, assistant.

MILICE BOHACHEVSKY, born in Western Ukraine in 1884, and educated for the priesthood at the University of Innsbruck, Austria, was ordained in January, 1909. He received his doctorate in theology and for eight years was professor at the Ukrainian Seminary of Lviv.

Successively named Rector of the Lviv Cathedral and Vicar General of the diocese, he was consecrated Bishop in 1924 and assigned to the Ukrainian Diocese of America. His silver jubilee of consecration was celebrated this past summer at Stamford, Conn. where Ukrainians from all parts of the United States and Canada gathered to honor their leader.

THE PARISH anniversary will recall the beginnings of Ukrainian parochial life in Rochester. The formal organizing of St. Joseph's parish took place July 5, 1909, in the church hall of St. Stanislaus Church, where the newly arrived pastor, the Rev. Dr. Sembratovich, announced the purchase of land on Remington Street and the intention to build the first Ukrainian church in the city.

His parish numbered 100 members who for six years had been meeting for Mass and social gatherings in a rented hall on Clinton Ave. at Grand St. They were immigrants from Rohatyn County in the Western Ukraine and had been spiritually cared for by the regular visits of Ukrainian priests from Troy, Elmira Heights, Buffalo and Auburn.

THE FIRST PARISH church was begun in August, 1909, and completed for consecration by the Most Rev. Peter Orlynsky, Ukrainian Catholic Bishop from Philadelphia, in May, 1910. The iconostasis of St. Joseph's was consecrated a month earlier by Bishop Orlynsky in the presence of the late Bishop Thomas F. Hickey of Rochester.

The next significant year of parish history was 1914 when the Rev. Vasyl Merenkiv, pastor from 1912 to 1915, purchased a church building at 305 Hudson Avenue from a Protestant group called the Evangelical Society for \$26,000.

After long legal tangles the new parish then set up a corporation composed of the Bishop of Rochester and his Vicar General plus the parish priest and two lay trustees elected by the parishioners.

IN SUCCEEDING years the following were pastors of the growing parish: Rev. Michael Lyjak, '15-'17; Rev. Volodymyr Spoltakovich, '17-'19; Rev. Constantine Kurilla, '19-'21; Rev. Stephen Vachyayyn, '21-'23.

Able and energetic Rev. Basil Turula became pastor in Dec. 1923 and served 26 years until his retirement in 1949 and his succession by the present pastor, the Rev. Stephen Holowid.

Under Father Turula the church was cleared of all debts, a parish hall was built and a small day school was organized under direction of the Sisters Servants of Mary Immaculate.

THE PARISH now counts over 300 families, Ukrainians from all over the city, operates its own parochial school of 8 grades, and has 21 active lay organizations. Since 1936, when the parish hall and day school were first opened, the Ukrainian school has grown to an enrollment of 190 children, brought to the Hudson Avenue school in their own bus.

50 Enrolled In Inquiry Class

5 Per Cent Rise Brings School Total To 33,431

School enrollment in the 102 Rochester Independent School Districts has increased 5 per cent over the total of 32,403 reported in the official census released this week by the Rev. Charles J. Madden, superintendent of schools.

A total of 1,111 pupils in 17 students are listed for the 11 elementary schools, 15 secondary schools and six higher educational institutions in the diocese.

A breakdown of these figures shows 7,518 pupils in the elementary schools, 4,985 in the high schools and 1,028 in higher education. Fifty-one kindergarten children in the diocese show a total of 2,362 youngsters registered.

All elementary and high schools have an enrollment of 32,403. Of the total, 22,928 are credited to the Rochester and suburban (Brighton, La Grèce and Irondequoit) area.

LARGEST SINGLE educational institution with registration of 1,707 is in the among secondary schools are Nazareth Academy with 1,177 and Our Lady of Mercy High School, 867.

Three Rochester elementary schools lead registration in that group. They are St. Monica's with 354 pupils, Holy Rosary, 301 and Sacred Heart, 250.

Higher education totals show Nazareth College with 4428, St. Bernard's Seminary, 199 and St. Andrew's Seminary (supper classes) 96. Registration in schools of nursing is listed as St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester, 139, St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira 120 and St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell 36.

In a statement issued previously by Dr. Mahoney pointed out that taxpayers of the twelve county Rochester Diocese are being saved more than \$6,000,000 yearly by the self-supporting operation of Catholic educational institutions.

College Girls Show Interest In Catholic Church

Illness An intense interest in things Catholic was revealed by students of Wells College, a non-Catholic women's college in Aurora, at a series of lectures he gave there recently, according to the Rev. Donald M. Cleary, chaplain of the Cornell University Newman Club.

The questions asked by the girls, Father Cleary declared were very fair, showing an interest in things Catholic, a desire for knowledge and at times a vast misconception about things Catholic, both historically, doctrinally, and from the viewpoint of Catholic prejudice.

Father Cleary gave a two-day series of five lectures on the nature and importance of religion, the position of the Papacy in world affairs, basic Catholic doctrine, the Liturgy and the Catholic philosophy of education. Three times he said, the question and answer period after his talks had to be halted at a two-hour deadline.

In my opinion, the priest commented, the whole experience could easily be used as a pattern in other colleges, rather than banking in three men of the major faiths at one time and having the discussion degenerate into a partisans exhibition.
