

Half-Way Mark Reached In Dominican Campaign

A total of \$10,601 has been raised to date in the enrollment campaign for the Association of the Perpetual Rosary according to Harry J. Lagonegro.

Appreciable progress is being made in the campaign to obtain funds for erecting an addition to the Dominican Monastery on Rosary Hill, Elmira. It was also reported at a meeting held Sunday in Columbus Center of the seminary.

THE AMOUNT reported represents a little more than half the amount needed to begin construction on the proposed addition that is needed to accommodate applicants seeking admission at this time.

The present building is taxed to capacity and it is hoped that sufficient funds may be raised in the Diocese to enable the Sisters to proceed with their extension plans.

A preliminary report shows the break down of the funds raised up to this time by areas in the Diocese. The figures are: Elmira \$6,192.00; Rochester \$1,666.00; Buffalo \$560.00; Horseheads \$330.00; Hornell \$219.00; Corning \$71.00; Waverly \$71.00; Elmira Heights \$70.00; Watkins Glen \$28.00. A total of \$1,285.00 from miscellaneous sources has been received.

Ukrainian Bishop Lauds Parish 40-Year Progress

Rochester's Ukrainian Catholics received encouraging praise for their parochial achievements and loyalty to St. Joseph's Church from the Most Rev. Constantine Bohachevsky, Bishop of the U.S. Catholic Ukrainian Diocese, at the parish's 40th anniversary Mass celebrated last Sunday in the Hudson Avenue church.

Bishop Bohachevsky was the celebrant of the Jubilee High Mass in the Byzantine-Slavonic rite and preached the sermon lauding the parish for a "unity of faith and of national pride" which has made St. Joseph's prosper for 40 years.

Pointing particularly to the new parish school facilities where 100 children are enrolled, the Bishop described the present educational progress as "the shining light of parish work through the years."

IN THE DIRECT appeal to parents and young people of the parish Bishop Bohachevsky pleaded for a strong interest in vocations to the Ukrainian priesthood and sisterhood. The parish has four young men presently studying at St. Basil's Seminary in Stamford, Conn.

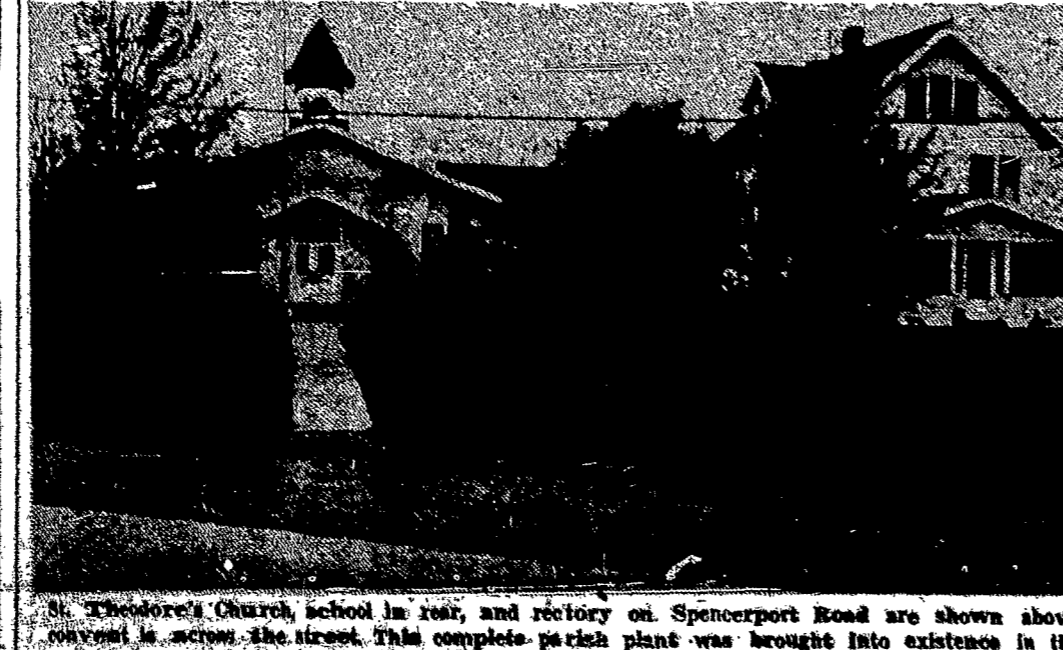
