

County Holy Name Men Assemble Monday For Feast Day Mass At Holy Redeemer

Delegations of Holy Name Society men from 11 parishes in Rochester and Monroe County will mark the Feast of the Holy Name at 11 a. m. Monday, Jan. 2, in Holy Redeemer Church, Hudson and Clifford Avenues.

Approximately 1,000 men are expected to crowd the church for the solemn Pontifical Mass to be celebrated by His Excellency Bishop Kearney and to hear the message of the Very Rev. Augustine J. Aylward, C.S.S.R., rector of Our Lady of the Lake Retreat House, Geneva, who will preach the sermon.

A procession of Mass officers headed by Bishop Kearney will precede the traditionally colorful Pontifical Sacrifice. Executive committees of the Diocesan and Deany Holy Name Unions will assemble in the church vestibule and march to the front pews in a body.

Officers of the Mass will include the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, P.A., V.G., assistant priest; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. F. William Stauder, pastor of Holy Redeemer Church and first spiritual director of the Diocesan Holy Name Union, and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George W. Eckl, pastor of St. Andrew's Church. Sponsoring the Mass is the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union. It will be the fourth an-

spiritual director, deacon; the Rev. William J. Schifferl, assistant pastor of Holy Redeemer Church, subdeacon; the Rev. Dr. John E. Maney, secretary to Bishop Kearney, master of ceremonies. Students of St. Andrew's Seminary will fill the minor offices.

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Maryknoll Seminarians Aid Science's Cold Cure Bid

Maryknoll, N. Y. — (NC) — Students at the Maryknoll Seminary and novices at the Maryknoll Sisters Motherhouse have been taking pills daily for the sake of science.

HALF OF THE young religious have been taking a new anti-cold drug; the other half have been swallowing pills similar in appearance but without any medicinal value. Initial results of the experiment indicate that medicine to eliminate the common cold may be on the market soon. The Nepera Co., a research and manufacturing laboratory in Yonkers, N. Y., supplied the pills for this long-term study. All the seminarians found a

pill on an upturned water glass in front of their plates each meal. The Maryknoll Sister novices lined up after meals to receive their tablets. Half of each group received the same type of pill daily and recorded were kept to compare results.

NINETY PER CENT of those who received the cold pills did not suffer from colds during the year of the test. In the other group, 20 per cent were without colds for the same period; another 20 per cent got into the second phase of colds, with breakdown and redness of the nasal tissues; and 60 per cent developed full colds, with pains, aches, cough, and temperature.

In another aspect of the study, 90 per cent of those who took cold pills within 48 hours after the onset of a cold responded favorably. The experiment is still being conducted with the cooperation of the young Maryknoll seminarians and novices.

Weekly Earnings Drop In Elmira

The average weekly earnings of production workers in New York State factories declined 64 cents to \$37.60 between September and October of this year, according to Industrial Commission Edward Corsi. During October, average hourly earnings were \$1.4 and the average work week was 38.7 hours.

Lower earnings in the New York City, Elmira, Albany, Buffalo and Kingston areas more than offset increases in other sections of the State. The sharpest drops were reported by Elmira, \$1.36 and New York City, \$1.18.

Dominicans Win In Zoning Dispute

Dover, Mass. — (RNS) — Permission to establish a priory here has been granted to the Roman Catholic Dominican Order by the Board of Appeals. Approval of the step came after an initial application of the Dominicans had been rejected by the town selectmen on the ground that zoning laws did not permit the erection of such an institution.

The Appeals Board advised the Dominicans to seek a "variance" of the by-laws and then re-apply for a certificate of occupancy of their recently-purchased 78-acre estate.

Earlier, Attorney General Francis E. Kelly of Massachusetts demanded that Dover rescind its zoning law. He said the case would be taken to court "if this unconstitutional and un-American-by-law" was not rescinded promptly.

Corning Man's Model Church On Lawn During Holidays

Corning — One of the outstanding outdoor Christmas decorations this year is one at the home of John J. Scheb, retired glassworker, at his home, 188 W. Fourth St. Flanked by Christmas trees, colored lights is a model church patterned after St. Mary's Church in many respects.

In an appropriate setting of a lawn dotted with tiny evergreen trees and also covered with simulated snow, the model church stands two feet wide and with its spire rising four feet above the ground.

AT THE TOP of the spire is a small cross and in the belfry is a small figure of a bellringer. With the starting of a minute motor the figure goes into action.

A radio receiver has been installed in the vicinity which picks up the music of records played in the Scheb home. A realistic group of cardboard choir boy cut-outs stands in front of the altar.

Marble steps, pews and stained glass windows complete the ensemble which is lighted by small electric bulbs.
