
Some people are honestly sur prised to hear that the Catholic Hierarchy of the United States sets sside Septuagesima Sunda; each year as "Biblical Sunday

She was buried from the Chapel of the Sacred Heart on the Scanian plantation near

THE SCANLAN estate includes parcels of property in booming downtown Houston, some of which is estimated to be worth \$2,000 per front inch. in addition there are the 8.000. acre family plantation, thousands of head of cattle, 12 oil wells: worth about \$150,000 apiece. a department store building in Galveston, lakeshore property in Chicago and several sections of oil land in West Texas.

Tim Scanian came to Heeston from Ireland to 1843. He topped his fantautic business. career by becoming mayor of Houston in 1873 and later postmaster. He died in 1906, having outlived his second wife and three of his 10 children.

The Scanian Foundation has, aiready given out about \$6,000 a year to the new St Thomas University, operated in Houston by the Basilian Fathera.
