

# Priest Makes First Films Of Secret Tibet Tribes

London—(NC)—The Rev. Jules Deiry, six-foot monk of the famous Great St. Bernard Hospice in Switzerland, has given the first showing of the films of a 2,000-mile journey he made through Tibet before the Royal Geographical Society here.

The priest, an expert boxer, skier, tennis player, cyclist and fisher, is also adept at judo.

In October, 1946, he began his perilous trek through the mountainous Tibet country forbidden to foreigners. His equipment consisted of his movie camera and a pair of field-glasses.

THE PURPOSE of his journey, Father Deiry explained to an audience of 1,000, was to help forward the work of the St. Bernard Fathers, who, since 1934, have maintained a tiny hospice in the Tibetan mountains, around which a small Christian colony has grown.

"It was necessary," Father Deiry explained, "to show the Tibetan lamas (priests) that the Order of St. Bernard was not intimidated by their action. In the district there were only 342 Christians left. They endured many hardships and were constantly under pressure by the lamas to change their religion. 'I wanted to try to find this

small community and to help them as best I could—and one of the best ways was to see the lamas and show them that the order was not afraid of them, I became friends with them, and they became more tolerant afterwards.

On one occasion, after many refusals, he was persuaded to demonstrate his shooting prowess. The chief lama at this spot, Father Deiry went on, once he realized that the movie camera meant no harm, delighted in starring in the film. He even allowed the priest to dress in his lama's robes, a sign of equality, and Father Deiry was himself photographed in them. A print of this picture, he said, proved to be a passport wherever he went afterwards.

Father Deiry was able to confirm for the members of the Royal Geographical Society the theory that in some parts of the country the people are cannibals, because it is almost impossible to get ordinary food.

# Cardinal's Film Script Published

St. Paul—(NC)—Publication in book form of the shooting script of the Cardinal Mindszenty movie, "Gully of Treason," was announced today by the Rev. Paul Bussard, editor of the Catholic Digest. (The Eagle Lion film opened at Etna's Regent Theater Wednesday and begins at Auburn's Jefferson Theater this Saturday.) The script was written by Ernest Lavory, well-known Hollywood writer who has written two other screen plays, "Hitler's Children" and "Behind the Rising Sun," and ten stage plays. First printing will be 100,000 copies. Bulk distribution will be from newsstands. The pocket-size book will retail for 25c. The movie and book are timed to appear together.

"Gully of Treason" dramatizes the arrest, torture, "trial," and imprisonment of Cardinal Mindszenty in Budapest a year ago, starring Charles Bickford as Cardinal Mindszenty.

# FCC Rule Threatens All Religious Broadcasts

New York—(RNSS)—The Federal Communications Commission was called on by the Religious Radio Association here not to use the First Amendment to the Constitution to outlaw religious radio stations. An extension of such a ruling, it was feared, would bar all religious programs from commercial stations also.

The request was made in a letter to Wayne Coy FCC chairman, from the association's president, Edward J. Heffron.

HEFFRON POINTED out that the government body recently raised the question of constitutionality in the case of reserving a band of radio frequencies for religious stations.

He also cited a later case in which an FCC hearing examiner denied a church's application for a standard broadcasting license on the ground that the FCC had not yet decided whether religious stations were constitutional.

He said the Commission regards all radio frequencies as "public property."

"WHAT IS threatened," Heffron said, "is a new and ominous extension of the McCollum decision. In that case the Supreme Court declared that the Federal government may not aid any religion of all religions, that public property may not be used for private (by which the court meant religious) purposes."

"If the Commission uses the McCollum decision against religious radio stations, logic would require it to apply the same rule against all religious programs on commercial stations. If the one is unconstitutional use of public property for private purposes, why not the other?"

Heffron argued that in granting a radio license the FCC was not meant by Congress to aid any person or institution, that its powers were limited to passing on the citizenship and character of any applicant for a license, and to regulating the operation of any successful applicant to make sure his broadcast was "in the public interest, convenience or necessity."

Dallas—(RNSS)—A TEXAS request for churches to operate low-power FM radio stations has raised the question whether religious broadcasts do not violate the U. S. Constitution.

DR. R. ALTON REED, director of radio activities for the Baptist General Convention of Texas said that an unfavorable ruling on the request could have these effects:

(1) No church or church owned institution could get permits for radio stations and scores of such stations already

any radio station would be a violation of the U. S. Constitution. The Baptist official originally conceived the idea of low-power FM stations (about 10 watts at a cost of \$2,500 each) as a means to promote religion. About 500 churches have indicated their interest in such stations. The FCC questioned whether "a specific category of religious broadcast stations" might be a violation of the First Amendment to the U. S. Constitution.
