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Catholic Press Goal Cited, Diocesan Newspaper Hailed In Hornell DCCW Panel

Hornell — The merits of the Catholic press in general and the Catholic Courier-Journal in particular were presented members of Court St. Ann, Catholic Daughters of America by a panel of officers of the Hornell District, NCCW, at a dinner meeting Monday evening.

Miss Helen Hogan, secretary of the Hornell district, was moderator of the discussion. She was assisted by Mrs. J. R. Ebert, head of the committee on organization, and Miss Dolores Hanrahan, chairman of the public relations committee.

From the viewpoint of the NCCW, Miss Hogan explained that the purpose of the Council is two-fold first, to serve as a medium through which Catholic women may express their opinion and when deemed necessary take united action on matters of public interest and, second, to stimulate the work of existing organizations of Catholic women to greater efficiency and usefulness to meet the needs of the times.

"TO FURTHER these worthwhile objectives we are encouraging the reading of Catholic publications that Catholic women will become aware of existing problems.
"Most of us, like the late Will Rogers know only what we read in the papers," Miss Hogan continued, "so it behooves us, as Catholics to know the views of the Church on the topics of the day. In the Courier-Journal you will find many controversial subjects treated by writers who will not only discuss them from the viewpoint of the Church but will point out the fallacies in the thinking of the journalists of the secular press."

Miss Hogan concluded her talk with the expressed hope that members of Court St. Ann would not only subscribe to the Catholic Courier-Journal but read it to find for themselves how well it lives up to the slogan "The Catholic press in the service of truth, justice and peace."
Miss Hogan presented Miss Dolores Hanrahan who contrasted the method of treatment of news stories in the Catholic and secular press.

"The secular press can never substitute for the Catholic press," Miss Hanrahan said "since the two have basically different philosophies. The secular press at its finest seeks to impart facts objectively and impersonally with no interpretation from a Catholic viewpoint.
"THE CATHOLIC PRESS has the God-given responsibility to investigate these facts and to submit them in the light of their effect on moral thinking. It can and should assist you to form a right conscience on matters of interest to your salvation. No secular press has that goal, since it is deemed to be materialistic world."

Miss Hanrahan cited several examples of news stories as covered by the secular press and the gist of the same stories as they interpreted in the Catholic Courier-Journal, from a Catholic viewpoint. She concluded her talk by the statement that the first move of athletic communists when they went out another country with the famed Iron Curtain is the suppression of the Catholic press. "If," she stated, "you do not read the Catholic press, you are just as effectively alienating it."
Mrs. J. R. Ebert spoke on features of the Catholic Courier-Journal, analyzing them from the standpoint of interest to various members of the family.

For the "man of the house," she strongly recommended the Rev. Richard McKeon's column. In some detail she dealt with his recent viewpoint on human relations and showed the possible effect on masculine as well as feminine thinking.
She suggested that all women present read Gretta Palmer's viewpoint on the equality for women legislation and spoke of

Rochester Man In Shakespeare Role At St. Bona
