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### Entire Aquinas Student Body In Silence, 3 Days

"A School Wrapped in Silence" could have been the subtitle of Aquinas Institute last week. And perhaps more impressed than any other person at the first annual schoolwide retreat was none other than a girl "reporter" from another high school.

"It was a wonderful experience," said Miss Jean Benvenuto, Charlotte High School Junior who spent a day attending retreat conferences with the boys at the Dewey Avenue Institute. "It made me realize how much religion should be a part of our everyday life."

It was mere coincidence that found 18-year-old Jean at Aquinas on Wednesday, Feb. 22, opening of the three-day retreat exercises. Given an English class assignment to write about a boy's school, she asked permission to visit Aquinas that day without knowing of the retreat.

"I WAS GREATLY impressed by all the boys learned about God," she said. "Boys in other schools where they don't teach religion are missing a lot."

By their relatively calm and perhaps somewhat unusual demeanor, the more than 1,700 students impressed not only Miss Benvenuto but also their faculty and the two guest Basilian retreat masters from Canada.

The boys were among the best retreatants I've seen," declared the Rev. Edward Hartmann, C.S.B. of the English Department of Assumption College, Windsor, who had charge of the program for the juniors, sophomores and freshmen at the main school.

"They were very receptive and endeavored to make a good retreat," said the Rev. Patrick Gorman, C.S.B. teacher of English and Religion at St. Michael's College, Toronto, who conducted exercises for the seniors at the La Grange Avenue annex.

**TODAY'S YOUTH**, Father Gorman noted, faces more temptations than heretofore, especially "the flood of indecent literature, comic books and quarter novels."

He urged the seniors to read the New Testament and the Imitation of Christ during the retreat. During conferences Father Gorman stressed greater love of God and more frequent Communion. He also dwelt on the need for prayer.

Father Hartmann pointed up the importance of salvation, development of an aversion to sin and consideration of the Mercy of God.

**THROUGHOUT** the three days the boys walked silently through halls which usually echo scurrying feet and buzzing voices. The day's program began with Mass and included spiritual reading in common, recitation of the Rosary in chapel and homiletics, spiritual reading, religious discussions, periods and Benediction.

The Rev. Eugene A. Cullinan, C.S.B., principal commended the students for their conduct during the exercises. He expressed the hope they would pursue the good resolutions they made.

The school was "back to normal" this week with the boys still impressed at the new experience of having spent three days in an endeavor among other things, not to speak with their pals as they passed them in the corridors.

### St. Bonaventure Seminar Draws Youth Workers

Five leading federal and state authorities on juvenile delinquency will meet at St. Bonaventure College Tuesday March 7 to discuss in a seminar the vital problems affecting the treatment of the child in conflict.

Sponsored by the college's Department of Social Sciences, the daylong seminar has been opened to sociologists, social and public welfare workers, guidance counsellors, children's court judges, police officers, boy and girl scout executives, students and others.

**HEADING UP** the discussions will be George A. Lankes, special agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Joseph F. Corsica, senior parole officer of New York State, Edward Hanna, probation and parole officer U. S. Courts, and Albert Roche and Charles S. Antonina, examiners of the N. Y. State Department of Corrections.

Very Rev. Juvencio Lalor, O.F.M., president of St. Bonaventure College and Fr. Gerard W. McMillan, O.F.M., vice-president and Sociology department head also will speak.

The seminar, first of its kind held in this area is a "grass roots" attempt to discuss what has been done and what should be done in the field of juvenile delinquency. It will also afford sociology students at the college an opportunity to become acquainted with the practical aspects of the juvenile delinquency problem and will serve as a preliminary on a local basis to the White House Conference on Child Welfare to be held in December.

The seminar, whose theme is "The Treatment of the Child in Conflict," will be opened in Butler Memorial Gymnasium at 10 a.m. After a luncheon it will resume at 2 p.m.

Dr. Don C. Manning, former director of youth parole in the state training schools and now a faculty member of the college's Sociology Department, will present the speakers.
