### General Howley, Soviet-Smeared Director Of Berlin Government Slated At Aquinas

Brigadier General Frank L. Howley (Reserve), Director of the U.S. Military Government in Berlin until his resignation in October, 1949, will speak in the final lecture of the Aquinas Christian Culture Series, Friday, May 5 in Aquinas Auditorium.

Each year, an authority on current events is presented in an open date in the series. The Rev. J. A. Malone, C.S.B., Series Director announced General Howley as the speaker.

**THE GENERAL** is the man who for four years was the target of some of the vilest calumnies in the Soviet press and radio of Berlin. He was the unrefuted and unremorseful subject of more Communist abuse than almost any other American in the occupation forces.

If Soviet-controlled newspapers are to be believed, Howley was the man who was solely responsible for the blockade of Berlin and the split in the four-power command.

**IN THE TWO** years that he was American Commandant in the German capital, prior to this appointment, he was Deputy Commandant for two years.

General Howley earned high respect among Allied leaders and Germans for his unyielding firmness in dealing with the Soviets in either bribery or force. In either bribery or force, the result of his County took necessary or billingsgate the last talking General's deal his own with the Russians.

A veteran of the early occupation days he had his first argument with the Russians at the Elbe when, as a colonel, he wanted to bring his American

**NEW JERSEY BORN**, General Frank L. Howley was graduated from New York University where he won fame as end on Chick Meekhan football team. He studied art in Paris for a time and then entered the advertising business in Philadelphia. A Cavalry Reserve officer, he was and still is an enthusiastic horseman.

Called to active Army duty in 1940, he arrived in Europe in 1944 and on D Day flew four times to France as commander of the largest British American Civil Affairs team. Since the cessation of hostilities he has been in Germany.

The man who has borne the brunt of differences with Soviet officers in countless hours toward the conference table now returns home to tell Americans what he has learned in four years of four power negotiation.

### Europeans Too Religious For Red Influence - Prince Otto

Religion is too deep in the hearts of Europeans to be uprooted by any amount of Communist persecution, Archduke Otto von Hapsburg declared in his lecture here Sunday evening at Aquinas Institute.

Discussing Russian plans for the conquest of Eastern Europe by controlling the Catholic Church, the Austrian nobleman said: "That is easier said than done."

Because the Church is usually important in the lives of eastern Europeans, he asserted, the Soviet Union hopes that by eliminating Catholicism it will be able to gain complete economic control.

**HE EXPRESSED** the opinion that all Catholics behind the Iron Curtain are ready to go "under ground" to resort to secret aid and protection from the Red Army.

Denouncing the red tactics in the countries behind the Iron Curtain, he pointed out that in Poland a different approach is being tried. Instead of attacking the Church openly, the Soviet is using economic weapons. By forcing bidding collections during church services, the Archduke explained, Moscow is slowly draining economic support necessary to the Church's existence.

The speaker warned that by a series of "crises" brought about in Iron Curtain countries through Russian influence, Moscow plans to gain complete control by the middle of 1952. He said an unpublished letter from the Kremlin has directed puppet rulers in Eastern Europe to wipe out religion entirely within two years.

(Continued from Page 1A) Msgr. John P. Boland, moderator of the Lake Erie region.

"The unchanging orthodoxy" of the Roman Catholic church was blamed for attacks on the church today by the Rev. Joseph E. Schieder, national youth director of the National Catholic Welfare Conference in a morning session.

**FATHER SCHIEDER** contended that most of those who preach against the Catholic Church and denounce the Catholic faith as static and old-fashioned and Catholic leadership as reactionary and "spiritual fascism" would desert from their callings if the church would eradicate the fixed convictions of its constant faith.

"No small part of the malice currently fostered against Catholicism, no small part of the fight for freedom of thought among students," Father Schieder said, "is due to the fact that persons divided among themselves in heresy, resent and despise Catholic insistence on the Divine rights of religious orthodoxy, on the necessity for unqualified and unchanging adherence in letter and in spirit, to God's revelation of Himself through Jesus Christ yesterday, today and forever the same."
