Bishop To Open Campaign For New School In Newark

Newark — A fund-raising campaign for construction of a new \$300,000 parochial school for St. Michael's parish here will get under way with a dinner-dance on Thursday, April 13, the Rev. Henry J. Dreybeck, pastor of St. Michael's announced today.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney, who last November encouraged the parishioners to undertake the school project, and Leonard Martini, experienced Syracuse driver-worker will be the guest speakers. A corps of 100 captains and workers will canvass the parish from April 13 to 27 to obtain pledges for the building fund.

THE PROJECT, one-story school building was designed by the well-known Rochester architect, Leo Ribson.

Modern in design throughout, and featuring a separate kindergarten unit, as well as classrooms, a combination auditorium and gym, meeting rooms, showers and kitchen facilities, the school and its equipment will cost nearly \$300,000. It will be located on Newark's Main Street opposite the church.

Father Dreybeck announced that the school would open with a kindergarten and two grades in September, 1939, and that other grades and facilities would be added gradually to complete the elementary unit from kindergarten through the eighth grade.

THE PASTOR said he had found many laymen enthusiastic to cooperate in this pioneering work of establishing for the first time a parochial school in Newark.

The drive for funds is the largest in the history of the village but a 20-month payment period has been arranged enabling every wage-earner in the parish to have a generous part in the campaign.

Fred A. Burger, local manager of the New York Telephone Co., and prominent in civic affairs is chairman of the Executive Committee. Co-chairmen are Dr. F. J. Langezaeta and Francis Smith. William E. Noonan is Special Gifts chairman in charge of Parish Gifts. John Kneeling is Auditor.

AS IN ANY new undertaking, some have questioned the advisability of such a project in Newark at this time. In order to acquiesce everyone in the village with all the factors involved,

new items, including the all the parochial workers, and meetings have been held during the campaign to discuss the reasons why the church insists on parochial school training wherever possible.

TO CREATE better public understanding of the reasons for a Catholic school, a group of non-Catholics representing a cross-section of village social and business life were invited to a dinner-meeting at which the whole story was presented to them and their questions answered.

The editor of Newark's *Journal* is the campaign.
