Dansville — The annual Dansville kite flying contest, sponsored by Council No. 785, Knights of Columbus will be held at the Municipal Airport Sunday afternoon, April 16. In case of unfavorable weather, Sunday, April 30, has been designated as alternate date.

**COMPETITION** is open to all children of the Dansville public and parochial schools between the ages of seven and sixteen. Each contestant must have an adult sponsor.

All kites must be constructed by the child with the aid of his sponsor. Boys and girls are both eligible to try for awards. All kites must be flown and controlled by the contestant with the assistance of the sponsor.

Besides the grand prize of a new bicycle more than fifty individual awards will be given. The Boy Scout Troop amassing the most points will receive the P. J. Jay Smith Award and to the Girl Scout Troop with the highest number of points will go the Genesee Country Express Award.
